

Plans and Schedules By Chaplain Lee Alphen

It is stakes season. You've been working hard all year, breaking the babies and training your older horses back after a few months off. Training programs are in place for each one. You tweak the schedules as you go along. However, you are certain each horse will be ready in time. Your calendar is marked, and you know when you have to be at each track.

There is a parable about a Chinese man who had one horse and one son. "One day the horse, out of control, wandered away with the boy on its back and they were both lost. The man's neighbors came to console him the next day and they said, 'We are so sorry you lost your horse and your son. It is so bad.' But the man said, 'How do you know that it is bad?' The next day the horse and the boy wandered back home. Trailing behind the horse were 13 wild horses that came right into the corral. The neighbors came to congratulate the man for having his horse and boy back and 13 new wild horses. They said, 'That's so good!' The man replied, 'How do you know that it is good?"

The author of the Letter of James cautions us, "You do not even know what will happen tomorrow" (James 4:14 NIV). Yes, we must plan months in advance, prayerfully with God's help. Then, we want always to be open to and listening for God's continued guidance. Trusting in the Lord, it is better to say, "If the Lord wills it, we shall do this or that" (James 4:15 NIV).

Of course, we certainly want to use the skill and intelligence God gave us to train our horses to the best of our ability and plan to have them ready for the races they fit. However, when, in

spite of our best efforts, things turn out differently, we trust God that, "In all things, God works for the good of those who love Him" (Romans 8:28 NIV).

The Chinese parable continues on, "The next day, when the boy was trying to break one of the wild horses, he was bucked off and broke his leg. His neighbors came and said, 'We're so sorry. It is so bad.' The man said, 'How do you know it's bad?' The next day a warlord came to confiscate all the ablebodied young men for his war but the man's son could not go because of his leg. The neighbors rejoiced and said it was good. But, the Chinese man said, 'We can't be sure if it is good news or not.' A week later..." and the story continues.

Our lives continue too. We make plans and our plans change. Are they good plans or bad plans? Do we trust God to guide us? When we do our best to do as God wants, things work out. Someone might ask, "How do I know what God wants? First, we do as God asks in the bible, then listen to that still small voice of the Spirit. God uses circumstances and the counsel of Godly, mature, Christian friends to help us find our way. Anne Graham Lotz suggests a strategy to seek God's Guidance at https://billygraham.org/ decision-magazine/february-2003/howto-seek-gods-guidance.

Remember, "In everything you do, put God first, and He will direct you and crown your efforts with success" (Proverbs 3:6 TLB). Chaplain Sam Spence refers to this proverb in his article on page 2.

Ultimately, we want to be sure the plans we follow lead us to God for all of eternity.

to work at Midland Acres. He was a loving and devoted husband, father, grandfather, and brother. Virgil was a member at the Church of Christ. He enjoyed going for rides, working with horses, mowing the church lawn, and picking on his grandchildren.

Brian Philip Cotton, 31, of Fairfield, IL, died May 11. He was a standardbred driver and was also

employed by ENS Metals.

James W. "Bill" Dailey, 57, of

Mechanicsburg, OH, died May 20. When
he was 16, Bill began his career in harness
racing. Bill's passion for standardbred
horses led him to major success as an
owner, trainer, and driver. Since the late

1970s, he sent over 8,000 horses to the



track with at least 1,200 wins. As a sulky driver, he sat behind approximately 20,000 horses, leading 2,301 into the winner's circle. He produced multiple Ohio Triple Crown winners and numerous Ohio and Indiana Sire Stake champions. Bill received the Jerry Kaltenbach Memorial Award over four times for "Ohio's Trainer of the Year." In his time away from the barn, he was an avid reader and enjoyed hunting grouse, pheasants and raccoons. Bill was a selfless man who was devoted to his wife and daughter and was always willing to lend a helping hand to anyone.

Sally Ann Fish, 85 of Crosby, MO, died March 27. Sally began her teaching career as her husband, Richard, a passionate harness horseman, finished Veterinary School. Throughout her earthly life, Sally's love of the Lord and family was instilled in her 4 sons and their families. In every place that the Fishes lived, Sally was also especially involved in local groups of PEO (60 + years), Sewing, Quilting, Bridge, and Church Choir. Sally was always a proud Kansas State Alum, avid sports fan, and an active member of their church. Her compassion for others always shined. She was also a CHHA Prayer Partner.

Earlier this week I was on my back patio in the early evening watching the birds come to the bird bath and feeder I had set up in the back yard. It was mostly sparrows and black birds that took



advantage of my offering, but at one point a big mockingbird flew in and lit on the feeder. Suddenly, as I was studying the mockingbird, that familiar "still small voice" rose up on the inside of me.

"Sam, I created that mockingbird and his special ability to mimic all those other birds for the pleasure of My children. There are a lot of small details involved that give the mockingbird this ability...but details are My speciality. And I'm very interested in the details of your life -- be they large or small. You don't come to me with near enough of those details. Trust Me, I can handle it."

As I meditated on this word from Him, I was reminded of the first scripture I ever received from the Lord...at least it was the first scripture that I was aware of that came from Him. It was in December, 1974. Our youngest daughter, Dondi, was asleep in the bassinette next to our bed. She woke up crying about 3 a.m., and it was my turn to change her. As my feet rolled over the side of our bed, a "neon sign" appeared before my eyes, which read: "Proverbs 3:6." I quickly changed Dondi and gave her to her mother to nurse, but the sign never left. In those days I'm not sure if I knew there were even three chapters in Proverbs, but I immediately proceeded to our den and pulled out a copy of The Living Bible. Proverbs 3:6 read: In everything you do, put God first, and he will direct you and crown your efforts with success.

Wow! In that one scripture, God was giving me a plan for my life. And that word, **everything**, certainly involved all the details of my being. In the years that followed, whatever success I enjoyed always came by putting God first. Regretfully, I failed in some areas where I simply "did my own thing," without consulting the Holy Spirit.

So, getting back to the mockingbird experience, I could see that the Lord was reminding me to get back to the basics...trusting Him with the details..

I'm impressed that this can apply to everyone who

reads this...hence, my sharing it with you.

Proverbs 3:5,6 NKJV






Norma Jean Huber, 84, died May 5. Norma accompanied her husband, Glenn A. Huber, at racetracks to watch their horses compete and also attended the annual USTA meetings during his tenure as director.

Derek Clarke Jacobus, 43, of Lewistown, IL, died May 6. After receiving an Associates Degree, Derek followed his dream and returned to farming. He was an active part of the community serving 10 years as the Fulton County Fair Board Director, was a trustee official for Lewistown township, and president of the Northern Illinois Colt Racing Association. Derek loved life. From race horses, to farming, hunting, and agriculture, Derek saw beauty in everything. Those left behind will remember

him for his quick smile, hard work, strength, intellect, and his ability to see everything in a positive light. Above all his main priority in life was helping others, bringing him joy to help those in need, whatever that need might be.

William Henry MacMullin, 87, of Ulster County, NY, died March 24. MacMullin was a longtime resident farrier and horseman at Blue Chip Farms and was responsible for the care of Hall of Fame stallions, Most Happy Fella and On The Road Again, during their stud careers. Over those decades, MacMullin was responsible for the hoof care of thousands of horses., including top broodmares Albaquel, Adore, Peaches N Cream and Treasure Blue Chip in addition to the entire herd of mares, foals and yearlings at the farm. He also worked many years on the racetrack.





Raymond J. Morandi, DVM, 86, died May 19. Dr Morandi opened Orland Park Equine Hospital on a 50-acre estate in the Chicago


area after serving in the Korean War and earning his veterinary degree. He treated standardbreds, including Rambling Willie, "the horse that God loved", at Chicago's racetracks during the day and performed surgeries throughout the night. "He loved his work," his son said. "He had such a work ethic and was good at what he did with a humbling nature. He was not just saving lives but pioneered techniques that kept horses racing."



Known as a leg man in horse circles, he pioneered treatments for leg and hock injuries. The equine hospital was also a popular field trip destination for school children.

Eugene R. Pokornowski, 77, died May 4. Eugene and his brother Raymond co-owned a number of standardbreds and raced them at Buffalo Raceway and Batavia Downs. He continued racing horses

until about 10 years ago. Eugene and his brother bought Wally's Club 20 in Kaisertown in 1969. They updated the place and renamed it Porky's Amber Lounge. He was a lifelong parishioner at St Casimir Catholic Church and a member of the Holy Name Society.



Tip Sheet for many years. Although he worked in various capacities in the field of law, his true passion was working in the equine industry. He was able to find work as a timer and photo finish operator at various tracks enabling him to create the tip sheet which has been a "bible" to many horse racing aficionados.

Ralph Sucee, 63, Oshawa, Ontario, died May 26. Ralph was a successful journalist in the harness racing community contributing articles for decades to publications such as TROT Magazine, Hoof Beats Magazine and The Canadian Sportsman. He also owned standardbreds. He sustained many injuries in a near-fatal automotive accident in 2007. A year later, Ralph was one of the first to come to the aid of injured horseman, Kurt Hughes. Kurt was involved in an accident confining him to a wheelchair.
