My, what a nice smile—except for the green and yellow hay-stained teeth. Whose scent is your horse picking up when he rolls his upper lip exposing his gums? Did you know that one ear back and the other forward might indicate your horse is eavesdropping into the stall behind?

We bond with our horses by walking them, playing with them, grooming them and just spending time with them. As we hang out together, we become more comfortable with each other. We also pay attention to what they are saying to us. They communicate with their ears, lips, tails and voice, with how they hold their heads and the how they stand.

People flocked to hear Jesus speak. He bonded with them by using metaphors and stories they understood. He talked about bread a lot. In fact, bread is mentioned 69 times in the gospels. We have the story of feeding the 5.000 with five loaves of bread and a few fish (Matthew 14:13-21) and the similar feeding of the 4,000 (Matthew 15:29-39). Jesus also refers to Himself many times as the "Bread of Life" (John 6:35).

My Irish grandmother made the most delicious Irish bread. I have her recipe. When I make it, my brothers and I polish it off quickly. When it comes out of the oven, the aroma fills the house. In Mexico, they grind corn every day and make tortillas. The tortillas we buy here at the grocery store can't compare to them. We all enjoy good fresh bread.

Jesus picked something we could all understand. Bread is good. It is our sustenance. God fed the Israelites another bread-like substance, manna, in the desert (Exodus 16:11-31). We joke about living on bread and water. We read in stories about the Second World War, the Holocaust and the Armenian genocide that people sometimes only had a crust of bread to eat. When we talk about bread, we are talking about something that keeps us alive. Of course, we realize a loaf of bread won't last forever, It gets old and stale. Bread stays with us for a little while, but eventually, we get hungry again. The bread Jesus offers lasts forever (John 6:35).

Jesus came so that we could have life and have it abundantly (John 10: 10). Jesus is our bread, our food, our nourishment. Jesus is instructing us to rely on Him, the source of life, fully committed to Him. When we do, we will be satisfied. Jesus wants us to bond with Him by spending time listening to Him, talking with Him, reading about Him in our bibles and just hanging out with Him.

Paul asks, "Who shall separate us from the love of Christ? Shall trouble or hardship or persecution or famine or nakedness or danger or sword" (Romans 8:35)? Nothing "will be able to separate us from the love of God that is in Christ Jesus our Lord" (Romans 8:39). This is our faith. This is what we believe. When

we trust in the Lord, God will take care of us. The more we understand Jesus and bond with Him, the happier we will be.

A Listening Ear

If you are a believer, you have accepted Jesus Christ as your Creator and Savior, but there is one other position or title you may not have afforded Him...Best Friend, which He very much desires to be in your



life. (If you are *not* a believer, you can pull aside, invite Jesus into your heart and be born again...and that does not have to be done in a church or some meeting; it can be done at your desk, or living room, or breakfast table.)

Most all "religion" is about keeping rules and regulations; but true Christianity is about relationship -- a one-on-one relationship between you and the Creator of the universe, and that's where the awesomeness of this Best Friend position comes into play. Think about a relationship or meeting you've had recently, maybe even today, with a good friend. You both talked and you both listened to what each other had to say. I'm convinced that Jesus wants to have that same type relationship with each of us -- there's talking (we call that praying), but there should also be listening on our part. Too often, I think, we voice our requests (prayers), ending with "in Jesus' name, amen." and we're out of the throne room without ever giving the Lord an opportunity to speak. He may have the answer to our prayer or some very relevant wisdom immediately available...if we'd only take the time to

Developing a listening spiritual ear takes practice. Most of us have been caught up in a rapid-moving, often stress-filled world that does not lend itself to "quiet time with the Lord." We have to diligently set aside time to "learn to listen." Mine is the first thing in the morning...first thing after a little wake-up exercise and a cup of java. And I must tell you that it took many mornings before I began to hear that "still small voice."

A wonderful Bible teacher and personal friend of mine, Andrew Wommack, told me years ago, "God is always talking." We just need to develop an "alwayslistening" spiritual ear. That includes spending time in His word and quiet time with Him. A listening ear can change your life.



Clyde B. "Barry" McNabb, 82, of Germantown, OH, died Aug 23. Clyde was a retired employee of Delco Products with more than 25 years of service, and he was the owner of numerous Standardbreds as well as an avid fan of horse racing.

Ed Mullinax, 85, of Amherst, OH, died on Aug 4. Ed owned and operated a number of successful automobile dealerships which allowed him to participate heavily in the sport. In fact, he was the sponsor of the 2016 Hambletonian. Although Mullinax owned at least 457 horses in conjunction with others and through his own Up Front Racing, the horse he will forever be most associated with was the late Dragon Again. He brought his beloved stallion to his home state so he could be close to

him in his final years. Mullinax also coveted his 2005 Little Brown Jug triumph with P-Forty-Seven.

Jane Baldt Ramsey, 81, of Wilmington, DE, died Jul 19. Though Jane was diagnosed many years ago with diabetes and heart disease, she never gave up. She never complained, maintaining a brave and cheerful outlook of an optimistic future -- even through countless hospitalizations and painful procedures. She would often say that getting old was not for sissies. Her passions were her animals and farming. She was an early champion of rescuing abandoned dogs, cats and horses. For 20 years she was involved with harness racing as an owner and trainer. She raced her horses in the tri-state area during the 1970s and 1980s. When her horses were retired, she spent a few years in the licensing office working for the Delaware Harness Racing Commission at Brandywine Race Track. She was a big supporter of the Ramsey's Farm Pumpkin Patch and often could be found teaching the children about farm



She was a faithful and active member of Maxwell Street Presbyterian Church.

John "Jack" Winner, 84, of Urbana, OH, died Jul 25. Jack worked for over thirty-five years and retired from Grimes/ Honeywell. His passions were harness racing, his small farm, going to the county fairs and hanging out with his special friend Wendy, whom he loved very much. He owned, trained and drove many horses over the sixty years he was involved with horses and harness racing. It was not a sport for just winning money for him; he loved the horses and the excitement, he bet very rarely. John



retired from training horses just last year. His favorite day was the third Thursday of September each year when The Little Brown Jug grand circuit horse races were at the Delaware County Fair.

William Henry "Bill" Faucher, 80, of Hinsdale, NH, died Aug 6. Bill spent his career as an owner, trainer, driver at tracks on the East coast, mostly in New England. He was a hardworking and skilled entrepreneur who built and maintained his own starting gates, which he used in his position as starter at many tracks in his later years. Bill also



owned and operated several successful businesses that included Hinsdale Harness (OTB), Faucher Paper Co., Faucher Trucking, and Route 63 Country Store all in the greater Hinsdale area. Active civically he served two terms as a New Hampshire State Representative, was a steadfast promoter of harness racing, and served as a USTA director. He was an accomplished licensed private pilot and owned his own plane for several years. He was a communicant of Saint Michael Roman Catholic Church in Brattleboro.

David Saville Fick died Aug 11. He was a kind and generous man. During a trip to Eastern Africa, David and his wife, Debbie, saw an opportunity for improvement in the entrepreneurial environment. This became his passion. David was CHHA member, Dan Fick's brother.
