Tragedy and Community By Chaplain Lee Alphen

Five horses trapped in a barn at First Line Training Centre in Ontario died in an early morning fire December 21st. According to a December 23rd Harness Racing Update article, it could have been much worse. Darkness, smoke and flames did not deter dedicated horsemen and horsewomen from risking their lives, returning again and again to the burning barn to save horse after horse. Dave Briggs reports in the article, "Scott Lecain, Trev Forgie, Rebecca and Steve Titus and Riley McGilloway are just some of the people credited with going into the burning barn with firefighters to pull horses out."

A series of avalanches in the Rocky Mountains trapped a dozen horses in a ravine in the *Heartland* Christmas episode. Following the example of two young people, the town rallied to prepare a way out for the animals. The horse owner, a hardened old man who estranged himself from family and friends after a tragedy years earlier, kept threatening them with his rifle.

Amy and Ty set out to shovel a path for the horses through the hardened snow. It was an impossible task until the whole town joined them with their shovels and eventually a bulldozer and some plywood. Community was formed. After several visits, a listening ear, and the voice of reason from Amy's grandfather, the owner of the horses put down his rifle, thanked those working to save his horses, and joined the shoveling crew. Eventually he reconciled with his family and neighbors.

John the Baptist's message

echoes the prophet Isaiah: "A voice of one calling in the wilderness, 'Prepare the way for the Lord, make straight paths for Him" (Luke 3:4, Isaiah 40:3).

John went to the Jordan to encourage people to remove the obstacles of sin and prepare for the coming Messiah. There at the river, lives were changed. Jesus also came and was baptized by John. Since Jesus never sinned, theoretically He did not need to be baptized. However, since He was both God and human, Jesus wanted to identify with the people. He insisted John baptize Him, and, with the others, was joined in a community of faith.

When we are baptized, we become part of the worldwide family of Christians with Jesus as our leader. When the way is difficult, we are not alone. Jesus never leaves our side and will often send sisters and brothers to help us.

As Christians, we want to be ready to hear Christ calling us and eager to respond with enthusiasm to our divine assignments. The brave people at First Line Training Centre certainly did. God was with them, covering them with a shield of protection from the blazing fire.

There is a strong sense of community in harness racing. Dave Briggs quotes Mark Steacy, "That's one thing about horse racing, [...] when tragedy comes, they are all there for you." Christian community is even stronger. At our racetracks, farms and training centers, let's continue to work together, making pathways for our God with our prayers, example and witness. Russell Baldwin, 79, of Plain City, OH, died December 22. His grandfather, Bruce Baldwin, introduced him to harness racing. When he was 17, he began racing. He raced at Scioto Downs and the county fair circuits in the summers and at Lebanon and Northfield Raceways during the winter months. Russ also raced some at Windsor Raceway. After



50 years, Russ semi-retired and became presiding judge at various Ohio county and

independent fair races.

Janine M. Grasso, 62, the wife of Horseman John Grasso, of Hawthorne, NY, died Dec 24. Janine was Director of Student Accounts for Manhattanville College in Purchase, NY for 18 years and was also President and CEO of John Grasso Stables, Inc.



Benney Lee Haller, 74, died Jan
1. Benney and his wife, Peg,
bought the former Heiby
Memorial Home in 1971. Later
they built a new funeral home,
the Haller Funeral Home. Benny
worked hard for the local
community holding offices in
many organizations. Besides his
tremendous sense of humor and
wit, many will remember him for



his passion of Standardbred racehorses, playing golf, hunting and fishing, and playing cards. He was a member of St. Mary Catholic Church.

George Albert Irving, DVM, 88, of NB, Canada died Dec

14. After graduating from veterinary school, George began a 31 year career with New Brunswick Department of Agriculture's Provincial Veterinary Service. He was the co-founder of Elmwood Veterinary Clinic and Community Animal Hospital. George's greatest passion was horseracing. He was involved in every aspect of the Standardbred horse industry. He served as director for the Maritimes at the USTA for



many years. He drove in his first race at 16 and had a long history in breeding, raising, training, and racing Standardbreds.

Taila Kaponinsky, 15, died a couple of weeks before Christmas. Taila considered Paul Fontaine's son Eric her father. Paul is a horse owner from Rhode Island.

Gerald T "Gerry" Kazmaier, 75, Far Hills, NJ and Pompano Beach, died Dec 4. Gerry began his driving career at Saratoga in the early 1960's and was soon hired by Roger Lareau to drive for his stable. He went on to enjoy success all across North America through a career which spanned thousands of miles and six decades. While much of his success came in the western half of the continent, Mr. Kazmaier captured a training and driving title at Freehold Raceway in the 1980's, snapping Herve Filion's 10-year streak atop the driver standings.

Terry Lee Kibler, 60, of Woodstock, VA, died Nov 26. Terry was the owner of Kibler's Furniture in Woodstock for more than 30 years and ran a successful harness racing business. He was past president and current board member of the Shenandoah County Fair Association, and Secretary of Harness Racing at the Fair. "Terry got involved in every aspect of racing you can think of," said Woodstock based trainer Betsy Brown, who trained and coowned horses with Kibler. "Over the decades, he's probably worked with hundreds of horses. If someone needed a hand to help paddock a horse, jog a horse, tack a shoe on or anything else, Terry was there to help. Everyone spoke highly of him," she added. "He was an honest and fair man. When Terry got a bill, there was a check in the mail the next day."

James "Jimmy" Landess, 64, died Dec 12. Jimmy was an accomplished Harness Race Driver racing all over the United States and Canada until being injured in a racing accident.

Maurice J. "Maury" May, 92, of Amherst, NY, died Dec 8. Maury was former president of the United States Harness Writers Association and a member of the organization for 55 years. He had a 47-year career at the Buffalo News and is remembered by colleagues as "the aide who ripped the news flash of the D-Day Invasion off the teletype machine. Among his several beats during his News career was the strong harness racing circuit of Buffalo-Batavia in Western New York. He chronicled the local racing and kept his readers abreast of area horses and horsemen who did well on the national harness racing scene. "Maury's Picks" was a longtime feature in the News.

Jan McPherson, 85, of Xenia, OH and FL, died Dec 3. After serving in the US Army, Jan taught high school math for many years in the Xenia Schools. His true loves were math and horses. He trained and drove harness horses, both his own and for Chip Noble Stables.

He was the winner of Harness Tracks of America's Dan Patch Award for excellence in communications in 2005, and received a 2010 Special Appreciation Award from the Delaware Standardbred Owners Association. Marvin owned harness horses for over 40 years.


Lori is also a big help to Pastor Joe's ministry at The Meadows and shares her talents and insight on the Meadows Standardbred Owners' Association board.
