Thinking Like a Horse By Chaplain Lee Alphen

According to Bruce Ranger, "It takes a while to learn to think like a horse." Greg Gehman and I were talking about today's fast race times. He said drivers don't sit and rate the mile so much anymore. All the quarters are fast. I called Bruce for his thoughts.

Bruce said, "Many drivers today just look at the overnight sheet, see they have the three hole and decide they are going to the top. They never waver. It is important to be flexible and adjust your strategy according to what is going on in the race. It takes a long time to become a good driver and you have to work at it. I go into a race with plan A, B, C and D." Bruce is in the moment with his horse and those around him from behind the starting gate to the finish line.

Jesus tells about a man who had two sons. One son begged him for his inheritance and went off squandering it on fast living. Broke and hungry, he realized even the pigs in his charge had a better life and wished they would share their pods with him. He thought about his father and what a good man he was. His father's hired help had plenty to eat and here he was dying of hunger (Luke 15:11-17).

Finally, he said, "I will get up and go to my father, and I will say to him, 'Father, I have sinned against heaven and before you; I am no longer worthy to be called your son; treat me like one of your hired hands,' So he set off and went to his father" (Luke 15:18-20).

"While he was still far off, his father saw him and was filled with compassion; he ran and put his arms around him and kissed him. ... [He] said to his slaves, 'Quickly, bring out a

robe—the best one—and put it on him: put a ring on his finger and sandals on his feet. And get the fatted calf and kill it, and let us eat and celebrate; for this son of mine was dead and is alive again: he was lost and is found!' And they began to celebrate" (Luke 15:20-24).

In the past, many trainers would drive the horses they trained. Bruce says, "Today, most drivers are catch drivers. We have many new catch drivers here in Maine. A person can't expect to just hop on a race bike and head to the gate and drive a good race. It takes a long time to become a good driver. New drivers can learn from watching other drivers and races and from their own mistakes. Some drivers don't want to listen to advice."

The Prodigal Son thought he knew it all and headed out rejecting his father, concerned only with the present. He expected life to be a rose garden. He had plenty of money and that was all he needed. His father and his family were not important. It took him a while before he realized how good his father was and just how much he missed him.

Sometimes we act like new catch drivers or the Prodigal Son. We are only concerned with this present world and want to live life on our own terms. We forget God in heaven who loves us and wants to see us succeed. God knows us and understands us and realizes why we do the things we do.

Jesus told the story of the Prodigal Son to show God's love for all people and God's desire to welcome everyone back into the family. As soon as we realize God and God's ways are what we really want and turn back to God, God forgets our sin, embraces us and gathers all of heaven to celebrate (Luke 15:7). It takes a while to understand how God thinks.

As always, thank you for all your prayers and kind thoughts by all partners. My health is what all the doctors are calling stable. (No horse pun intended).


From Chaplain John Prescott...

Donato "Don" Pasquale Latessa, 92, died Feb 19 in Pompano Beach. Don purchased the engineering company he worked for, Regal Diamond Grinding Wheel. In 1956, he patented a Flexible Abrasive Grinding Wheel. He further expanded his business and developed Finishers Supply Company. At 46, he sold his companies and went into horse racing. He served on the



Board of Directors at the Painesville Fairgrounds for many years. He was the owner, trainer, and driver of many harness horses before becoming a judge at many racetracks.

Billy E. Lichtenstiger, 89, of Ossian, IN, died March 7. He was born

October 25, 1929, in Decatur, IN, the son of the late Elias M. and Areda M. (Werling) Lichtenstiger. Billy earned a Bachelor in Education from Mankato State, served in the US Army (Korean War), and was a marketing specialist for General Electric Co. For over fifty years of his life, he also was very involved in the harness horse industry, breeding, training and racing



horses for Travel Gait Farms (with his father, Elias) and then his own Tiger Farm. During his racing career, he received many accolades from his peers and harness industry awards. He was also a member of the United States Trotting Assn. and The Christian Harness Horsemen's Assn. He is survived by his wife of 67 years, Hazel L. Lichtenstiger of Ossian, daughter Cindy Jo (John) Morr of Decatur, a grandson Andy C. Dobler of Alliance, NE, and two great-grandsons, Billy L. and Henry J. Dobler."

Harold Arthur MacInnis, age 73, died on Thursday, February 28, 2019 unexpectedly. He lived in

Massachusetts, then moved to Fairfax Virginia. Following retirement, he vacationed in Fort Lauderdale with his beloved wife for the winter months. He truly enjoyed meeting and chatting with his friends at Casablanca Cafe. Also, he loved vacationing at Cape Cod, MA and Ocean City, MD. He loved life to the



fullest. He enjoyed using the computer, chatting with friends, loved sports, harness and thoroughbreds horse racing, music, watching movies.

Lawrence E. "Larry" Marsh, 86, of Stafford, AZ, died Feb 16. Larry

was the creator of the first Arlington Million and co-founder of Hollywood Park Racetrack. John Berry called him "the man who really changed the face of" and "the finest thing ever to happen in the history of" Illinois racing. During his tenure in Thoroughbred and Standardbred racing, he impacted nearly every aspect of the business. Working as a lobbyist and director of racing and racing secretary. He



was also founder of Marsh Stud, a state-of-the-art breeding and training facility. Larry also created Solarflame Inc., one of the first solar energy companies, and LeRoy Power Alcohol, Inc., an ethanol fuel production company.

Eugene D. "Gene" Oldford, 86, of Michigan, died Feb 25. His

career in harness racing as a breeder, owner, and administrator led to his induction into the Michigan Harness Horsemen's Association Hall of Fame as numerous other accolades. Gene founded Oldford and Associates, an automotive manufacturer's representative sales firm, in 1973 where he continued to work until his unexpected



death. He was also co-founder of Black River Manufacturing, Port Huron. His son, Stephen, is a U.S. Trotting Association director and amateur driving champion.

Linton A. Quirrion, 80, a resident of Livermore, ME, died February 18. He proudly served in the U. S. Navy. Linton worked in the paper industry retiring from Sappi Pulp and Paper Company, Hinckley. Linton and his wife, Tina, were actively involved with their race horses for 55 years.



Edward R. "Bramps" Rohr III, 72, died March 18. Bramps' biggest passion was harness racing. He grew up frequenting race tracks with his father and continued on the tradition with his children. He bought his first horse in 1989 and has owned horses ever since. He was very proud of all his children and the work ethic he instilled in them. In the most recent years, he could always be found at the track rooting on his grandson who is working on becoming a professional harness driver.

Kirk A. Sparks, 47, died March 11. Kirk loved training horses with his dad, Oakley, and worked as a trainer off and on for 27-plus years. If Mr. Sparks was known by one thing, it was the love he had for his kids — he doted on them. He was so proud of their academic and sports accomplishments. He also taught them the value of hard work. In his spare time, he loved to hunt and fish, but regularly had his kids going with him.

Charles D. "Doug" Stovall, 81, of Lebanon, OH, died Feb 10. After

being in business with his father as a ceramic tile craftsman, Doug pursued his horse racing career in the mid-1970s. He was an owner, trainer, and driver until his health prevented him from being active. He loved watching the races and all sports, playing cards, and took pride in mowing the paddocks and yard.



Orson Lester "Buck" Weaver, 91, of Harvard, IL, died Feb 8. Buck taught high school and coached several different sports in

Wisconsin. Later he purchased a farm and installed a half-mile racetrack. For the next several decades, he broke, trained, and raced Standardbreds and broke yearlings. His children, Sara and Wayne, grew up training and racing horses alongside their father, and continue in the sport to this day. Buck was known as an announcer throughout the Midwest. For almost 60 years, he was known



as the voice of the Northern Illinois Colt Association and also served on its board of directors. In addition to his well-known catchphrases, such as "Heeeere they come" and "There's pacers coming from everywhere,"

Kelly spent his life serving our Lord in missions, pastoring churches, and as chaplain at our racetracks. Most recently, he was chaplain at Pompano Park Raceway. The





horsemen and women there loved his weekly bible study. Kelly and his wonderful wife, Jacqueline, enjoyed many exciting adventures. He adored his daughter Rolline, son, Tommy, two grandchildren, twin boy great-grandsons and his great-granddaughter. His Lord and his family were his life.

Wilbur D. "Will" Kirkwood, 86, of Townsend, DE, died March 18.
Will began training and driving harness horses in the early 1970s. He found his greatest joy working on the family horse farm, Wilchar Farm. Throughout his life, Will volunteered in many organizations. He founded the

many organizations. He founded the Middletown Chamber of Commerce and served as the Charter President for many

years. The chamber honors him each year by awarding a deserving member the Will Kirkwood President's Award.
