Trophies and Medals By Chaplain Lee Alphen

An oversized floral garland adorned Preakness winner War of Will in the winner's circle. Later his owner, Gary Barber, was presented with a duplicate of the Woodlawn Vase. Preakness officials say the original is the most valuable trophy in American sports.

According to www.necn.com, "The Woodlawn Vase is an ornate, Tiffanydesigned solid sterling silver piece dating back to 1860. A 1983 insurance appraisal valued the vase, which stands 34 inches tall and weighs 29 pounds, at \$1 million. Today it is estimated to be worth \$4 million."

My trophies include a silver platter from Vernon Downs, a nice pewter carving set from Ontario, a big vase from Suffolk Downs, win pictures, some plagues and other items. Some of our members surly have dens full of trophies from racing and other sports or activities. Others have pictures of their kids, grandkids and pets.

During the Revolutionary War, on July 4, 1776 delegates from the thirteen American colonies signed the Declaration of Independence. Over the last two and a half centuries plus, brave men and women in the United States military have been awarded trophies-medals, for their selfless service in upholding our Constitution by promoting peace and keeping us safe.

To date about 1.8 million Purple Hearts have been awarded to those wounded or killed in battle. 3,400 Medals of Honor, the highest award for valor in action against an enemy

force, have been presented to individuals serving in the U.S. military. Many others have received the Distinguished Service Cross for extraordinary heroism.

Then there was Jesus. Centuries before Jesus was born the prophet Isaiah told how God's servant would endure pain and suffering to bring peace to the world. Isaiah says how the Suffering Servant would be beaten, and killed because of our sins (Isaiah 53:4-6). "He humbled himself and became obedient to the point of death—even death on a cross" Paul says, applying this image to Jesus (Philippians 2:8). With the price of His torture, humiliation and death, Jesus reclaimed our salvation. The sacrifice of Jesus opened the gates of heaven for all of us who believe.

No one honored Jesus with a trophy or a medal. Yet the glory of heaven described in Revelation, chapters 21



and 22 sure outdoes my paltry trophies and even the Woodlawn Vase of the Preakness Society.

The sacrifice of the men and women who give their lives for our freedom is a gift like no other. These people are

Power in the Word



Ewell Elton Binkley, 83, of Henning, TN, died May 20. Ewell was a trainer and driver of Standardbreds. He was a member of Walnut Grove Baptist Church and the United States Trotting Association, and an Army National Guard veteran.


Bernard Francis Brennan, VMD, 97, of Hobe Sound, FL died April 26. Bernie began his veterinary practice in

Aiken, SC. He moved to Westbury, NY in 1953 establishing an equine practice at Roosevelt Raceway where he was supervising veterinarian and opened a surgical hospital. Dr. Brennan was an active member of the American Association of Equine Practitioners since its founding in 1954 and served as its President in 1979. He was a long

standing member of the Knights of Columbus.

Dr. C. E. 'Ted' Clarke, 71, of Elmira, Ontario, died April 27. He co-owned Eldale Veterinary Clinic and was a

practicing veterinarian while being heavily involved with the management of Elmira Raceway. He helped steer the track from financial ruin while he served as the horseperson's representative with the Ontario Harness Horse Association (OHHA). He became the official general manager of Elmira Raceway in 1995, while still maintaining his veterinary practice and pioneered a number of



John P. "Harry" Cummings Sr, 73, died May 11. Harry

began his 42 year racing career when he was 22 with a couple homebreds. He had the distinction of being the patriarch of one of the largest families of drivers in New York State. John Cummings Jr, Tony Cummings, Todd Cummings and Kevin Cummings were taught the ropes by their father and have all been training and driving since they were old enough to get their licenses. His wife, children and horses were his primary passion.

Kelvin V Gale died May 17. Kelvin and Eleanor worked side by side for many years on their farm in Helena milking cows and raising their children before they moved to Bombay where they farmed Standardbred horses. His passion was Racehorses. He enjoyed





watching the races and keeping track of all the sales and who bought what horse. Kelvin and Eleanor celebrated their 60th anniversary April 11th.

Diane L. Norris, 79, died April 25. Diane and her

husband, Gordon, were active participants in harness racing in Michigan and at Pompano Park. She enjoyed grooming, training, naming the horses and keeping the stables running smoothly. The Gordon Norris Stables topped the training charts in Michigan and at Pompano Park for many years. She and her husband were inducted



together into the Michigan Harness Horsemen's Association's Hall of Fame and the Florida Hall of Fame.

David K. Ritter, 73, died May 18. David was a second generation horseman who raced horses for more than 25 years at Ohio racetracks and fair circuits. He retired from racing in 1996, but stayed involved through his son, Mike Wilder. He loved the racing dearly and watched daily.



Thomas Jefferson Throgmorton,

95, of Marion, IL, May 22. Tom was a proud World War II pilot. Tom co-founded Central Technology Incorporated as a chemical engineer and was

instrumental in the space race. He also designed and developed the original net trap cannons which launched nets over wildlife for safe capture. Later he founded Winn-Star, a defense contractor which continues to operate today under the guidance of Tom's grandson. Tom was instrumental in bringing mounted horseback fox hunting back to Southern Illinois. He



was also a Standardbred horse owner for more than 30 vears maintaining a stable of horses at the Williamson County Fairgrounds where he served on the fair board. He worked hard to keep the local fair and its racing program in operation.

Mike Weller, 60, of Milton, Ontario, died recently. Mike was an Ohio native and longtime southern Ontario-based Standardbred trainer. Mike and his wife, Sue Woodyatt, took a leave of absence from their positions in the industry to explore cancer treatment options outside of Canada.

Jerry Knappenberger, 76, of Newark, OH, died June 3. Jerry was a longtime general manager of the Ohio Harness Horsemen's Association. He began his 50-year harness racing career as a second trainer for his high school classmate, Terry Holton. After a 25-year stint with the Holton stable, he was hired as the assistant general manager of the OHHA taking over the top spot in 1998. Jerry was elected into the OHHA's Hall of Fame in 2015. He worked tirelessly for the introduction of Video Lottery Terminals in the state of Ohio returning our industry in Ohio to its place of prominence with increased purses at the four commercial tracks and the 65 county fairs. CHHA and HHYF have been designated to receive gifts in lieu of flowers in memory of Jerry.

Ursula (Urs) Joan Ayd, 84, died May 1. Ursula was active in Maryland racing as a breeder, owner and advocate for harness racing, After her retirement from Western Electiric-AT&T, she and her husband, Joe, were introduced to Standardbred racing by her son-in-law, Jim Ayd.


