

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Dancing with the Son By Chaplain Lee Alphen

Herman Drenth reminded me "You can't announce a horse race without a program." Knowing the horses and drivers is imperative. Larry Lederman concurs and adds, "Names of trainers and owners are also important for the post parade."

"Sunflowers stand at attention facing east," it said in a book I just read. "Then, throughout the day, they move with their faces upward, gradually following the sun" (Dancing with the Sun" by Kay Bratt).

What kind of experiences have you had in your lives? School, cooking, car repairs, golf, swimming, flying a plane? Have you trained or driven harness horses? You have probably walked a horse.

Can we experience something by reading a book? I've read about war. Does that mean I've experienced it?

We can read a whole library full of books on how to fly a plane. But, until we actually get into the cockpit and head down the runway, tilt the nose into the air and head for the clouds and blue sky, we won't actually experience flying a plane.

You may be an avid golfer. However, for me, sitting in the family room watching golf on TV with my brother counts as watching golf on TV, not experiencing golf.

We drive races from the grandstand, hollering for the horse to go to the outside, trot faster, faster, faster. Are we all race drivers?

Have we experienced Jesus? Sure, we go to church and read our bibles. But, have we really experienced Jesus? Jesus said, "No one puts new wine into old wineskins; otherwise, the wine will burst the skins, and the wine is lost, and so are the skins; but one puts new wine into fresh wineskins" (Mark 2:22).

Friends, each day God gives us is a new day. We will always do well to greet each new day in a new way—as the advertisers say, "a new and improved way."

Consider Psalm 22. "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me? Why are you so far from helping me, from the words of my groaning? O my God, I cry by day, but you do not answer; and by night, but find no rest" (Psalm 22:1-2)

David's story told in the Old Testament tells of a man favored by God who often falls into temptation. In this passage David is crying out to God, searching for a renewed relationship, wanting to hear God's voice and, especially, is eager for forgiveness. Each time, when David realizes he disobeyed God, David seeks God out, repents and commits to live for the Lord, to walk in relationship with God.

Walter G Gower Sr, 87, died June 28. Walter owned and operated Hillsdale Farm in Allentown, NJ. He was a farmer and owned, trained and drove harness horses. Walter was well known, well respected and well liked in the harness industry. He will be deeply missed.



Ron Jellis, 77, of Pompano Beach, died July 6. Ron owned and bred harness horses for 55 years. While racing at Pompano, he changed the lives of many people in our industry. The last few years health wise were tough, but never once did you hear him complain. It was, "What can I do for you, not what can you do for me?" Love for family and friends were above and beyond. Ron worked as a service manager in the car business. As a boss, you never worked for him rather you worked with him. Everybody he met almost immediately became a better person.

Leonard LeBlanc, 80, died July 22. For many years Leonard was a top trainer in New England. He drastically cut his stable when his late wife and partner in the business, Noella, died in 2013. However, he did continue to race one or two to keep his hand in the sport that he loved. He also ran the LeBlanc Standardbred training center in Gardner, Massachusetts where many trainers stabled and trucked in to race at Plainridge Racecourse. The New England Harness Writers Association recognized Leonard over the years for his accomplishments.

Harry Locke, 89, of Oshawa, Ontario, died July 4. Harry is a longtime Standardbred owner of such notables as Deal Direct, Jet Pace and Northwest.

Carol Okusko, 83, of the Vernon, NY area, died July 15.

In her early working career she was employed with the Utica Phone Company. She and her husband, Howard, then operated the Utica Dry Cleaning Company and later the Utica Paint Company. Later on the couple became involved with harness racing at Vernon Downs. Howard still operates a very successful stable. Carol was a great advocate for the local horsemen and women and the sport of harness racing while serving as vice president of Harness Horsemen's Association of Central New York.



John Pantalone, 76, died July 5. John began a photography business in 1972. One of his first clients was Liberty Bell Park. This led to the development of World Wide Racing Photos which was the track photographer at Brandywine, Liberty Bell, Garden State, Freehold, and Harrah's Philadelphia. The firm acquired a reputation for quick and quality development and production of track photography. His innovative mind



brought about the start of the many of the oversize "tribute" photos that owners purchased to mark especially big wins with their horses.

Claude Richards, 60, died July 9. Claude began his career as a horseman at 15. He won his first drive on his 21st birthday and was hooked on harness racing. Claude was great with breaking babies. He raced throughout the United States, but Pompano was his home.



Catherine "Kay" Sudano Caras Spitaliere died

recently. She was a tireless worker for the Lord. 30 years ago she started a women's class craft night weekly on the backstretch of Belmont and that was just one of the endless number of missions of love that encompassed her every waking moment. Her son, Nick Caras, has been working with Chaplain Humberto Chavez for many, many years providing recreational opportunities to stable area workers and their families.

Richard "Rich" A. Suda, 76, of Darien, IL, died recently. Rich and his wife, Ruth, owned and bred harness horses. They were partners and good friends with Jim and Judy Ferguson for over 30 years.



CHHA Scholarship Committee chairperson, Lisa Schwartz, wrote to Casey Hite, "The Rambling Willie Scholarship is special to us because that was "The Horse that God Loved" and so entitled was the book about him. He had a race tour of 17 cities during his time and is an Immortal Hall of Fame member, as we may well know. Rambling Willie was not only a great competitor earning over two million dollars, he was the greatest four-legged promoter of Standardbred Racing of his time. A marketing wonder!"

Because of Casey's faith-filled application and her passion for the promotion and marketing of Standardbred racing, Casey received the Rambling Willie Scholarship to continue her studies in Corporate Communications at Pennsylvania State University – Fayette. Lisa points out that CHHA is making, "a wise investment in the future of the corporate communications role Casey is sure to be playing in the perpetuation of the Standardbred industry."

As Casey approaches her senior year she writes, "God has blessed me with amazing relationships and memories to last a lifetime while working toward my degree."

As a starting pitcher on the girls' softball team, she leads the team in prayer before each game. She says, "I am a proud Christian and share my views regularly. I know things won't always be easy, especially in this industry, but a close relationship with God will help with the difficult moments. The racing industry is very volatile right now. We are at a crossroads where we can either shoot forward or continue to slowly decline. I feel this can only be done with public relationships. This is
