## Photo Finishes and Dead Heats By Chaplain Lee Alphen

Courtly Choice pulled ahead of Lather Up coming down the stretch to win the 2018 Little Brown Jug by a neck in a four-horse photo finish. In 1989, once Park Avenue Joe and Probe hit the stretch, they were racing as if harnessed together all the way to the wire in the two-horse Hambletonian race off. The race was declared the first and only Hambletonian dead heat.

Jesus tells of a landowner going out at dawn to hire workers for his vineyard. They agreed to work for the usual daily wage. Every three hours he went out and hired more workers. At the end of the day, he told the foreman to summon the workers and pay them, beginning with the last. The first workers were ticked off when they found out everyone got the same pay (Matthew 20:1-16).

Do we race in cheap claimers, stakes races or the triple crown in this race of life? Who is the competition? Our race is more of an obstacle course. I found Charley in the bathroom shaving and said, "God just gave me a word about this cancer: ADVENTURE! Listen to the definition." I read it to him and said, "The risk and danger part is obvious, and the exciting and remarkable part will be my closer, more intimate walk with God." My outlook improved immediately. I was inspired with this personal revelation from God. I would look at the road ahead as an adventure with great rewards along the way.

A couple of weeks later, God gave me confirmation. I really like my oncologist, Dr VanDeusen, and his most capable assistant, Melissa. They staved very positive as they went into great detail describing the chemotherapy drugs, administration schedule, side effects and treatments for the side effects. I likened Melissa to Mary Poppins and told her so. She is full of Grace. After an hour long consultation, when Charley and I felt that all our questions had all been answered, Dr. VanDeusen got up to leave the room. Then he stopped and turned back around and said, "Consider it an adventure!" Then he turned and left. Charley and I looked at each other and I said, "God just winked at us!" I truly wonder if any Oncologist has ever called chemotherapy an Adventure! But this one sure did! And it was a heavenly confirmation that God knows exactly where I am and has me in the palm of His Hand!

I'm on weekly chemo until September 10, then once every three weeks until next June. The side effects are humbling and uncomfortable, but not devastating. My body struggles to correct itself amidst the punishment being dealt. I have learned the tremendous power in thanking God in the midst of the storm, and I truly feel the pain and discomfort subside as I do. I can absolutely feel the energy and strength flowing through my body from the love and prayers of so many family and friends. Charley is being a saint and we have grown even closer to each other and in our walk with the Lord. The prognosis is excellent with the prescribed treatment. I appreciate your prayers of THANKSGIVING as I know I am healed and safe in God's Loving Arms.




Gary Lee Cook, 76, of Fremont, OH, died August. 13. Gary was a longtime owner of Standardbreds. In addition to horses, he was also into late model cars. sprint car racing and loved playing cards.

Timothy Dempster, 58, of Meadowlands, PA, died August 12, 2019. Tim was a graduate of Red Tomlinson Horse Shoeing School and had been working as a farrier at the Meadows. He had been a part of the Meadows since he was a young child. According to Lori Romanetti, "Not only was Tim an excellent blacksmith but he was one of the kindest, soft-spoken men you would ever meet. There wasn't anyone that

Ralph Henry English, 75, of Marlborough, MA, died August 7. Ralph began training harness horses in New England in the 1970s and was honored by The New England Harness Writers Association. He has been training for more than 30 years



Stakes winners. He also played a huge roll in the success of big name stables and trainers such as Continental Farms and Team Nordin. According to the Florida Standardbred Owners Association, Joe was one of the highly respected and likable horsemen in harness racing. In his typical and humble style, he said, "I won the lottery the day I met my wife!" Joe worked until he was satisfied that every horse in his care was satisfied to his high standards. "

Harold (Junior) Howard Limkeman, 81, of Mt. Sterling, IL, died July 24. Harold served his country in the US Army. He was a foreman for Mobil Chemical Company in Jacksonville, Illinois for over 20 years. He was a member of the First Baptist Church of Mt. Sterling. Harold also loved harness racing and had owned and trained Standardbred race horses since 1966.



Donald G Ratchford, 75, died August 8. Donald came to the United States with Joe O'Brien and later worked with other top horsemen. He was a successful trainer-driver and farm manager and was a partner and operator of the Highland Farm, a breeding and training facility for about 15 years.

Dr Robert H McGaughey, III, 76, Murray, KY, died

June 14. Bob was a great friend to many and a lifelong harness racing fan. He owned claimers with Eddie Morgan, Jr at Louisville Downs, in First Amendment Stable partnership with Max Heath and other newspaper types, and later with VIP Stable. "Doc," as he was known, was head of the Department of



Journalism at Murray State University and kept in touch with students on a lifelong basis.

Anthony J. Parenti, 87, died August. 1. Anthony was a

longtime former police chief of Fanwood, NJ and former president of the Standardbred Breeders and Owners Association of New Jersey. He was a career police official for 60 years. He also became involved in harness racing as a horse owner. He was elected to several three-year terms on the Standardbred Breeders and Owners Association Board of Directors.



His colleagues elected Anthony as president for 14 years of the SBOANJ.

Daniel Tuccillo, 78, of Prospect, CT, died recently. When he wasn't earning a living running his business, Daniel

loved harness racing. He raced all over New England. With the help of his wife and son, Dan Jr, he built a small but competitive stable and even trained the 1984 Massachusetts Sire Stake 2-yearold pacing filly of the year, Wynn's Mabel By. Daniel retired from full time racing in the mid-1990s but, when Plainridge Park opened in 1999, an amateur driving club was formed, and he couldn't wait to get back in and



compete. As a charter member of the New England Amateur Harness Driver's Club, he campaigned several horses each year including right up until the time of his passing.

Fely Villas, 77, of Windsor, Ontario, died April 14. Fely was a devout Catholic and an active parishioner at Holy Name of Mary Church and was a member of the Filipino Choir. She worked as a medical lab technician at Grace Hospital and retired from Hotel Dieu Grace. CHHA member, Jo-Dee Brown, trained horses for Fely's husband, Rene.



Dale Williamson, 76, died July 17. Benjamin Todd Williamson, 65, died July 22. Both men were nephews of CHHA member and prayer partner, Clara Gordon. Both died of cancer. Three more family members are battling cancer. Please keep Clara and her family in your prayers.
