DNA and Relationships By Chaplain Lee Alphen

Watch out ancestry.com! Here comes the USTA. Foals must now have a DNA sample sent to the USTA as part of the registration process to insure they are registered with the proper pedigree. In addition, the USTA has a leg up on Life Lock and the other identity protection services. Starting this year, all foals are required to have microchips implanted in their necks. I guess that's to prevent imposters and to avoid stolen identities.

"What did you buy," someone might ask you at the Harrisburg or Lexington Yearling Sale. Your answer will generally include the name of the sire and possibly the dam. Breeders and buyers study bloodlines, knowing relationships are an important indicator for great racehorses. Bettors also consider progeny information, especially at the big races like the Hambletonian and the Little Brown Jug.

The Lord sent Samuel to anoint one of Jesse's sons to be king. A feast was prepared and, one by one, Jesse brought his seven oldest sons to Samuel. Each time the Lord insisted this was not the one. 

Joseph A. Amico Sr, 96, died August 22. Joseph had a career as a builder. He was also heavily involved in harness racing in western New York for more than 55 years.

Claudean Cone, 73, of Georgetown, KY died September 11. Claudean was a well-known Bluegrass horse breeder. In recent years she operated Millstream Farm in Kentucky and in Allentown, NJ, in partnership with her daughter, Christine.

Robert A Gabettie, 81, of Dumont, NJ, died September 1. Robert was a trainer for many years at The Meadowlands, Freehold and Monticello. He loved the sport of horse racing, was a great trainer and loved handicapping. He was also an avid New York Yankees fan, loving husband, father, "Poppy" and friend who never missed his children's or grandchildren's games or events.

Linda Jones, 74, died September 3. Linda was the widow of Michigan Hall of Fame horseman ,Larry Jones. According to her daughter-in-law, Kari Neale Jones' Face Book page, "Linda worked many years at the Spring and Fall meets at Jackson Harness Raceway. She also worked taking horse entries at the Michigan Summer fairs. She loved working the fairs with her bestest friends! At home, she cleaned horse stalls, horse equipment, racing colors, and did everyday barn work."

Gerald D Kelly, 81, of Warsaw, VA, died August 15. Gerald had been in the harness industry as an owner and trainer for more than 50 years. He was campaigning his two horse stable at Ocean Downs at the time of his death. Gerald was considered a class act by everyone who encountered him at the track and will be missed by all.

Janelle Diane Miller, 19, of Shipshewana, IN, died August 13. Her parents, Wayne and Sue Miller have harness horses. Janelle was working in housecleaning for the Farmstead Inn & Conference Center, Shipshewana and was a member of the Old Order Amish Church.

Del Pletcher, 89, died August 15. Del was a Standardbred horse owner, trainer and driver. His career spanned eight decades at racetracks throughout the Midwest. He served his country in the US Army during the Korean Conflict.



Eugenie R. Ceklarz Prescott, 91, of South Portland, ME

died August 31. During World War II her father led the local Polish resistance movement in France. When she was 14, Eugenie worked the coal mines and transported coal riding her bicycle to nearby Belgian farms in exchange for food. She was aware her father had hidden messages in the handlebar of her bicycle but was unaware of what the messages said. She carried the messages across the Northwest



corner of France twice a month for two years staying at various farms along the way. She later learned the French Resistance group was also harboring paratroopers from England and helping the town's Jewish Community acquire identification papers. She was recognized as an Allied Veteran of the United States and awarded Veterans Benefits. Eugenie's son, Rev John Prescott, serves as chaplain at Vernon Downs.

Ronald Randall, 76, died September 7. He was a retired chemistry teacher at Roosevelt High School, where he taught for more than 20 years. Ronald was a proud Standardbred owner and trainer for more than 20 years. He spent more than 50 years racing horses. He was well known throughout Ohio for his stakes winners with "Rose Run" in their names.

Terry Reid, 55, died August 29. Terry raced horses with his father, Frank, for more than 30 years in Canada and the United States. He always had a joke or two to tell and a big heart. He treated all his horses like pets, giving them nothing but the best of care.

Ramona Smith, 83, of Auburn, ME, died August 30.

Ramona worked as the Secretary at Lewiston Raceway and for the telephone company. She was involved in and enjoyed Harness Racing for many years, owning and training race horses until 2018. She was very active, living in and maintaining her childhood home as well as working with her horses. Her family was most important to her. He daughter Donna also races horses at



Scarborough. In recent years, Ramona attended our Bible Studies at Scarborough Downs.

Phil Wentworth died September 1. Phil began grooming, training and driving horses in 1956. After attending USTA Officials School in 1967 he became identifier at Pocono. He served as Assistant Racing Secretary, Racing Secretary and Associate Judge at 22 different tracks. After many years as Associate Judge at Ocean Downs and Colonial Downs, he retired in 2009. He was also involved with pedigree reading at horse sales over the years.

Roland "Roly" Alfred Day, 65, of Franklin, NH, died September 3. As a child, Roly enjoyed playing baseball, spending time with family, helping his father, New England Hall of Fame Driver, Bucky Day, taking care of racehorses, and as the only boy, teasing his sisters. He was
