## **Lessons from Secretariat** By Chaplain Lee Alphen

Secretariat bursts onto the movie screen, rounding the turn into the stretch. Excitement builds as he as he continues on top, moving away from the field all the way to the wire and winning by 31 lengths in 2:24 breaking all records over the dirt for a mile and a half. Of course, he won! Estimates say his heart weighed 22 pounds. Dr. Thomas Swerczek, who performed the autopsy on Secretariat, said his heart "was almost twice the average size, and a third larger than any equine heart I'd ever seen." Secretariat also had an incredible conformation (https:// www.horseracingnation.com/news/ The Tremendous Size of Secretariat s Heart 123#).

In a horse race, anticipation always mounts as the field rounds the turn at the head of the stretch. Just imagine the anticipation as David faced off with the giant, Goliath, armed with only a slingshot and his faith in God (1 Samuel 17:1-51). The crowds were rooting for Secretariat, knowing he was a great horse. King Saul and the rest of David's supporters likely saw David's stand against Goliath as a last ditch effort. His brothers thought he was reckless and foolish. They could only hope. Daniel, thrown to the lions, emerged unharmed, astounding the king's corrupt administrators as King Darius rejoiced and gave thanks to Daniel's God (Daniel 6:1-27).

The movie opens with Penny Chenery, Secretariat's owner, reciting God's words to Job, "Do you give the horse its strength? [...] It paws fiercely, rejoicing in its strength. [...] It does not shy away from the sword" Job 39: 19,

21, 22).

Later, Penny talks about Secretariat "running the race of life well" (1 Corinthians 9:24). She believes in this son of Bold Ruler who they say won't be able to go the distance as she and her team prepare him for the triple crown races. Almost everyone is against her, telling her she has to sell him, saving, "It can't be done."

Life often takes twists and turns. Where is our focus? Penny's was on preparing Secretariat for the challenges he would face on the track.



We have challenges at work, with our horses, our relationships, our health, and in doing God's will.

God reminds Job about horses running into battle (Job 39:25). What battles are we facing? With the dirt kicking up behind Secretariat as he gallops down the training track, we hear Penny say, "He knows what to do when the trumpet sounds" (Job 39:24). The angel will sound the seventh trumpet when Christ returns (Revelation 11:15).

With Penny's guidance and perseverance, Secretariat saved the family farm and taught her family and everyone in horse racing a mighty lesson. In the face of pressure and ridicule from all sides, Penny said, "I don't care how many times they say, 'No, you can't do it,' I'm not giving up. [...] We are going to live rejoicing." Secretariat's world record still stands.

We too can live rejoicing when we place our trust in God. Sure, there will be bumps in the road, but we know "the Lord is on our side" (Psalm 118:6). We can put our faith in God as, "We know that in all things God works for the good of those who love Him, who have been called according to His purpose" (Romans 8:28).

During the stretch run, the hymn "O Happy Day" plays. It draws from an 18th century hymn:

# O, happy day!

When Jesus washed my sins away! He taught me how to watch and pray, And live rejoicing every day.

Secretariat was ready when the bugle called him to the track. Let's be ready when the angel blows the trumpet to call us home.

Remember in Matthew 14 when Peter and the disciples were out on the Sea of Galilee in the middle of a raging storm? "Immediately Jesus reached out His hand and caught him" (Matthew 14:31). Bruno Coccia, 70, died Dec 14. Bruno was the owner of Genesee Printers Inc. and Microera Printers Inc. He was also a co-owner of the Rochester Flash Men's Soccer Team and the C.C.O. Harness Racing Stables. He raced several horses in western New York from the late 70's to the mid 80's.

Larry Eugene Coleman, 74, of Humboldt, IA, died Dec 23. Larry enjoyed a career as a Standardbred owner, trainer, and driver spanning 50 years. He operated a public stable in central Illinois with his former wife, Jeanne, before relocating to his native Iowa.

Carol Jean Vietmeier Day, 86, of Grand Junction, CO, died Dec 27. She taught 1st through 8th grades in a one room school house in Hyde County South Dakota. Later she worked as a substitute teacher and then a secretary. Carol was Hall of Fame jockey, Pat Day's, mother.

The Reverend Paul L. Hershey died Jan 15. Paul was stationed at the Pentagon while serving in the US Army and volunteered in the youth department at the YMCA in Washington DC. After his discharge, he served as Executive Director of the YMCA. He was transferred to numerous states and eventually to the Republic of Panama where he ran the Armed Services YMCA. After retiring, Paul moved to Ohio, and assumed the role of Race Track Chaplain, serving three racetracks in Ohio. He also served as an interim pastor for several area churches.

**Dr Thomas Lazzaro**, 77, died Dec 8. Dr Lazzaro will be remembered for his dedication to the treatment of mental illness. He was passionate about the theater, even investing in several plays. His biggest passion was harness racing, and he never missed watching his horses race.

Ruth Mattheus died Nov 23. In her youth, Ruth traveled, did tent revivals and fasted 40 days every summer. She was named for Ruth in the Bible. She was Amy Bondon's beloved, Christ loving roommate while recuperating at Palm Garden. There was no family to visit her as she lay dying for several months, yet her faith was strong.

John Pawlak, 71, died Dec 27. John was a former Director of

Publicity for the U.S. Trotting Association. He was hired by Raceway Park and did some odd jobs before taking over the announcer's job in March 1979. He also assisted the track's publicist with promotions, advertising and public relations. After about a year, he was named the publicist at Raceway Park and eventually traded in his announcer's microphone to focus on his

publicity and marketing duties. John joined the USTA in 1985 as the director of publicity. He was responsible for compiling and editing *The Trotting & Pacing Guide* and the historical







USTA Directors book. With his television background, he was the face of the USTA, led the organization into the age of online video and served as the host of the USTA's popular "Eye on Harness Racing" series. He retired in 2013.

Nicholas J. Saponara, 80, died Dec 7. He was a member of the Harness Racing Communicators Hall of Fame and a past president of the US Harness Writers Association, an organization to which he belonged for 57 years. After college, Nicholas worked 25 years in the sports department of the Philadelphia Bulletin as the handicapper and morning line oddsmaker for the tracks covered by the Bulletin. He also made the official track morning line at Brandywine, Liberty Bell, Atlantic City Harness, and the Keystone thoroughbred track. Nicholas also owned

Jonathan Blair Schuster, 61, of Shelbyville, IN, died Dec 25. Jon was Vice President and General Manager of Racing at the Indiana Grand Racing & Casino for 17 years. His love of horse racing began on his 10th birthday when his parents took him to the track for the first time. He was so grateful to have been able to work in the industry he loved.

William R "Bill" Stevens, 68, of Washington CH, OH, died Dec 14. Bill was a horse trainer for most of his adult life and had been a long-time member of the United States Trotting Association. Bill had a love for his family, his friends, and horses.

**Dr. Paul Eppler Thorpe, DVM of** Edgewater, Florida died Nov 19. Paul served in Vietnam as a search and rescue

helicopter pilot. He studied Veterinary medicine at UC Davis. In 1974, Paul moved to Lexington, Kentucky where he spent his career as an equine veterinarian. In his work, he was dedicated to his patients and most enjoyed the friendships, stories, and jokes shared during countless surgeries and farm calls.



**Bryce Norwood "Woody" Truitt**, 87, of Whaleyville, MD, died Nov 18. Bryce was a retired Standardbred trainer. His son, Randy, is an owner, trainer and driver.

## What is Your Focus

I was reminded lately of a horse we raced many years ago. It was one we raised named Bosley.

We broke him and trained him down at home. When it was almost time to qualify, I took him to Orangeville to get him used to the racetrack. Everything went well until I started his last mile. As I was going into the first turn, a coffee cup blew onto the track in front of him and he stepped on it. I thought he was going to jump right out of



the hopples. The next week I took him to train behind the starting gate. As I warmed up, I scored into the first turn right where he had stepped on the cup and sure enough, he jumped right over the exact spot. What would he do when I qualified him?

The next week I drew the rail in the qualifier. I left from the rail not knowing what to expect but he was focused on the starting gate and paced around the turn without missing a step. Every time I trained him, he would put a few steps in at the same point but never in a race. We raced that year around many Ontario tracks with a sire stake filly and took Bosley with us for an overnight race. At every track he would put in steps at the very same place warming up but in the race he would be perfect. Behind the gate, when he focused on the race and on the starting gate and nothing distracted him.

What can we learn from this about our life? If we stay focused on what the Lord has planned for us and stay focused on Jesus, we can overcome all the obstacles the world may throw at us. What is preventing you from serving the Lord to the best of your ability? Is it fear of failing, rejec-
