Sires, Dams and God By Chaplain Lee Alphen

Horses have sires and dams. We have mothers and fathers and God.


Hoof Beats ran an article in January 2019 titled "What Makes a Great Stallion." Rich Fisher Interviewed top breeders, trainers and agents. Winbak's Garrett Bell said, "Good breeding helps but is not essential." He also reminded us, "Great pedigree does not mean a great stallion." And, he said, "Many successful racehorses who are now stallions started with mediocre pedigrees."

Dr. John Mossbarger of Midland Acres said, "I do not believe it's (a great pedigree) totally essential in order to become a good stallion. I think what's important is that the stallion passes on his traits. If a stallion is going to the breeding shed, he probably had some good racing traits on the track or he wouldn't have the opportunity to go to the breeding shed."

Since all our parents come from God, they must have some good traits to pass on to us. In the First Letter of John we read, "Everyone who believes that Jesus is the Christ has become a child of God" (1 John 5:1 NLT). Some of the traits we receive from our parents may be mediocre. However, as children of God we inherit outstanding traits.

Jesus taught His disciples to pray the Lord's Prayer (Matthew 6:9-13). Below are some thoughts I've had while praying this beautiful prayer. When you pray it, pause and let your mind wander, thinking about the meaning of the words.

Our Father: God, the One who made us designed and created this entire incredible universe and



everything in it. After putting the physical space we call the world in place, God made all the animals and plants. Then God formed Adam and breathed life into him. With the breath of God, men and women came alive. You may want to think about the beautiful trees and flowers God created. Or see horses running in a clover filled field with squirrels and chipmunks running up and down the apple trees.

Who art in heaven: God's throne is in heaven (Isaiah 66:1; Revelation 4:1 -2). Christ will return from heaven riding a white horse, with His armies mounted on white horses, to judge the world (Revelation 19:11, 14). John explains in part of his vision, "Then the angel showed me a river with the water of life, clear as crystal, flowing from the throne of God and of the Lamb. It flowed down the center of the main street. On each side of the river grew a tree of life, bearing twelve crops of fruit, with a fresh crop each month. The leaves were used for medicine to heal the nations. No longer will there be a curse upon anything. For the throne of God and of the Lamb will be there, and his servants

will worship him" (Revelation 22:1-3). Heaven sure sounds like a place I want to go!

Hallowed be thy name: God's name is holy. The second commandment says, You shall not misuse the name of the Lord your God (Exodus 20:7). We keep God's name holy by using it to address God and to tell others about God, not in idle chatter. It is best to think of something else to say when we hit our finger while hammering nails in the shed row.

Your kingdom come: God's kingdom and will are perfect. Heaven is a beautiful place. God is there and when we join God, "There will be no more death, sadness, crying, or pain. All the old ways are gone" (Revelation 21:4).

Your will be done on earth as it is in heaven: We are happy here on earth when we are doing God's will. When we do nice things for others, we feel good about ourselves and when we say no to temptation we enjoy a sense of accomplishment.

Give us this day our daily bread: When we ask, God will give us everything we need for today (Matthew 7:10-12). God provided quail and manna for the Israelites to feed them in the desert (Exodus 16:16:11-18). Everything good comes from God (James 1:17).

Forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us: Think about this one. Do we hold grudges? Jesus said we must forgive seventyseven times (Matthew 18:22). That means always. We must, forgive our brothers and sisters from our hearts (Matthew 18:25). We are asking God to forgive us the same way we forgive others. Let's be reconciled to everyone so God can forgive us (Matthew 5:24, 6:14-15).

Lead us not into temptation but deliver us from evil: The devil tempted Jesus three times in the desert. The Gospel of Luke tells us Jesus was full of the Holy Spirit and led by the Spirit. Communication with God, doing God's will and the help of the Holy Spirit saved Jesus from falling into temptation (Luke 4:1-12). Jesus promised to send the Holy Spirit to everyone who loves Him and keeps His commands (John 14:15-16). The Holy Spirit will also help us to avoid temptation.

For Thine is the kingdom, the power and the glory forever and ever: Everything really belongs to God. Remember, God made it all from nothing. David rejoiced as gifts were brought for his son, Solomon, to build the temple of the Lord. He prayed the beautiful prayer printed below in front of the whole assembly, praising God (1 Chronicles 29:10-13).

Remember, "We are God's masterpiece. God has created us anew in Christ Jesus, so we can do the good

Cris Caldwell, 63, died May 15. Cris has been part of the auction team at Tattersalls and Keeneland for more than 40 years as a fourth-generation auctioneer. Cris worked this past January's Tattersalls Mixed Sale at the Meadowlands. He also ran the family's Gavel Ranch in Eagle Point, OR.



Forrest William "Bill" Carroll, 85, of Pinebluff, NC, died May 10. Bill learned to be a horseman from his parents. He proudly cared for the famed pacer Hillsota; together they captured the inaugural American Pacing Classic at Hollywood Park in 1955. He also served as a director for the PHHA for several years.

Lester Clemmons, 74, died May 9. Lester trained Standardbreds for many years at the Warren County Fairgrounds. He was the first trainer and previously a

part owner of the current Ohio sire Pet Rock. Jack D Cobb, died March 21. CHHA members Jack and his wife, Dena, stabled at Spring Garden Ranch. Jack bred, owned and trained Standardbreds since 1966.



Jean E. Edwards, 85, of Bucyrus, OH, died May 13. Jean was a groom for Standardbreds her entire life, working with her husband.

Joe Figliulo, 77, died May 3. Joe was a longtime employee of Batavia Downs working in the Racing and Mutuels departments. For several years he worked for the George W. Starling Horse Trucking Company. Then he was the Racing Secretary at Scarborough Downs from 2003 until his retirement in 2013.

Giovanni Finateri, 79, of Flint Township, MI, died May 4. Giovanni grew up in the interior of war torn Italy at the end of World War II. He overcame adversity, becoming a trainer, driver and owner of Standardbreds. He also owned multiple pizzerias and became a successful business owner.

Bernie Hanley, 84, of Batavia, died May 7. Bernie served in the US Army and was a longtime member of Resurrection Parish. He was well known harness racing owner/trainer for many years. Bernie and his wife, Mary Ann, were the owners and operators of Hanley's Restaurant just across the street from Batavia Downs.


Carlson D. Mancinelli, 83, died May 12. He was a carpenter for the Board of Education in Buffalo and an owner/trainer/ driver of Standardbreds racing at Buffalo Raceway and Batavia Downs.

Rick Marchese, 63, died April 27. He was a lifelong horseman. He suffered some ups

and downs related to injury and finances. In 2014, he attempted another comeback after catch-driving at Bluegrass Downs and then Colonial Downs.

Walter G. McIntire, Ph.D. died April 22. Walter taught at the University of Connecticut and later at the University of Maine. He worked as a racing official at Maine fairs and Bangor Raceway where he was Presiding Judge from 1995 thru 2013. Tex Moats, 76, of Fairfield, IL, died May 1. He was a well-known trainer, who was inducted into the Illinois Harness Racing Hall of Fame in 2005. Tex always said he "just wanted to be remembered as that dang ole coon hunter."

Chad Allen Moore, 22, of Washington Court House, OH, died May 4. Chad was involved in the Ohio Harness Horsemen's Association, the USTA, Fayette County Harness Horsemen's Association and the Above and Beyond 4-H Club where he excelled in rabbits, hogs and dairy calf.



Standardbreds, which began at the age of 14. He also enjoyed golfing and spending time on the lake. William V. "Bill" Rowland, 62, of Trotwood,

OH, died May 12. Bill retired from AK Steel (Armco) in 2007 after 30 years of service. He was an owner, driver and trainer of Standardbreds since 1986. James **B.** Sambaerg 85, died April 20. In



James P. Samberg, 85, died April 29. In 1983 James became the Batavia Downs Director of Publicity. Eventually he became

Vice President of Operations until the track's initial closure in 1997. James convinced Western Regional Off Track Betting with a proposal to buy the track. The re-

opened under its new ownership in 2002. **Ruth Stern** died May 1. Ruthie and her late husband, Artie, spent their summers at Monticello Raceway every weekend. She was larger than life and everyone at Monticello loved sitting down and talking to her. She got the nickname Ruthie Carrots by bringing huge bags of carrots to the barn and eventually named a horse she owned Ruthie Carrots.



Brian Wessells, 59, died May 10. Brian was a longtime Delaware trainer/driver who raced on the Eastern seaboard. He fought numerous medical battles over the years but he kept on coming back. His love for the sport of harness racing made him never give up.

Sophia Valkanoff, 94, formerly of Pompano Beach, FL and Pearl, MS, died April, 29. Sophia and her husband, Chris, owned the Midway Cafe in Lansing, MI, for 20-plus years. After retirement, they moved to Pompano Beach where owning Standardbreds became their passion and hobby. In 2009 the Valkanoffs were the Standardbred Breeders of the Year in Florida.
