My Horse is Dreaming By Chaplain Lee Alphen

Your horse is asleep on his side with his legs moving and ears twitching. His lips are quivering. You say to yourself, "That horse is dreaming! Was he running his last race in his sleep?" You hope he was dreaming of winning the Hambletonian or the Little Brown Jug. Have you spoken to him about the stakes schedule?

Your mare is "mumbling" in her sleep. Is she dreaming about the joys of parenting and showing her little filly how to pace across the field? No, I don't think she knows you just made the Juggette payment.



King David wanted to build a temple for the Lord. However, God said that was not his job. God promised David his heir would build the temple.

Solomon was 20 years old when his father, King David, died, leaving Solomon as King. Near the beginning of his reign, Solomon had a dream. God told him to ask for whatever he wanted.

Solomon acknowledged God's faithfulness and kindness to his father over the years. Then he explained to God that he was young and did not know how to carry out his duties as king and govern the vast numbers of God's chosen people. He asked God for, "a discerning heart to govern Your people and to distinguish between right and wrong" (1 Kings 3:6-9 NIV).

As the First Book of Kings tells the story, God "was happy that Solomon asked for wisdom. [...] You did not ask for long life and riches for yourself. [...] You asked for the wisdom to listen and make the right decisions. So I will give you what you asked for. I will make you wise and intelligent. I will make you wiser than anyone who ever lived or ever will live. And I will give you what you did not ask for. You will have riches and honor all your life. There will be no other king in the world as great as you. And I will give you a long life if you follow me and obey my laws and commands as your father David did.' Solomon woke up and knew that God had spoken to him in the dream" (1 Kings 3:10-15 ERV).

Solomon's dream came true.

Over time everyone in Israel was, "in awe, because they saw that he had wisdom from God to administer justice" (1 Kings 3:28 NIV). God gave Solomon wisdom on a wide variety of topics and people came from everywhere to listen to him (1 Kings 4:28-29).



"The queen of Sheba heard about Solomon, so she came to test him with hard questions. [...] She met Solomon and asked him all the questions that she could think of. Solomon answered all the questions.

[...] She also saw the beautiful palace he had built. She saw the food at the king's table. [...] She saw the servants in the palace and the good clothes they wore. She saw his parties and the sacrifices that he offered in the Lord's Temple. She was so amazed, she could hardly breathe!" (1 Kings 10 1-5 ERV).

After Solomon finished building the temple and consecrated it to the Lord, God appeared to him a second time. God told him he heard his prayer, consecrated the temple and promised that God's eyes and heart would always be there. God also told Solomon if he walked faithfully with God like his father, David had and obeyed all God's commands; he would always have a successor from his own family on the throne (1 Kings 9:4-5).

However, God continued, if Solomon or his descendants turned away from God and did not obey God's commands and started worshipping other gods, the temple would be destroyed and the people would be cut off from Israel, the land God gave them (1 Kings 9:6-8). Solomon went against the Lord God. When he died, his son, Rehoboam, succeeded him as king. He was a harsh ruler who also went against God, as did those who came after him. Eventually Israel was divided, the temple destroyed and the Israelites were deported to Babylon for a time.

We all have dreams. The question is how well do they coincide with God's plan for our lives. God created us and gave us our talents and personalities. If your mare that's dreaming about her filly winning the Jugette is a Thoroughbred, she doesn't have much of a chance. If your colt that is racing in his dreams is by Kadabra, he may have a shot in the Hambletonian.

God blessed King David as a warrior. David had a lot of blood on his hands from his many battles. Building a house for God was the job of a peacemaker. God created Solomon to fulfill that position (1 Chronicles 22:8-9). King David had a great relationship with God and listened when God spoke.

When we put God first, seeking God's will for all our undertakings, and asking God to help us understand how to best use our gifts and talents, God blesses us beyond anything we can imagine. God's dreams become our dreams and our dreams come true.

Real "Coco" Cormier, 84, died June 5. A longtime driver/trainer, CoCo and his wife, Tracy, owned the Pinehurst track restaurant for the past 24 years. He came to the USA from Quebec when he was in his early twenties and began his career as a trainer and driver. He raced in the New York/New Jersey area.

Roy Wayne Estes, 80, of New Holland, PA, died June 8. Roy loved to train and race Standardbreds. His racing took him many places around the country and eventually to Pennsylvania. Prior to his racing career, he was an industrial arts teacher in Ohio.

Fred T. Freppel, 74, of Napoleon, OH and Aiken, SC, died March 21. His greatest joy and pastime was harness racing. Fred was an officer for Northwest Ohio Colt Racing Association and served as the Speed Superintendent for the Henry County Fair. Fred worked for Arthur Young before starting his own Accounting practice.

Angelo Mario LaBella, 95, formerly of Syracuse, NY, died June 6. Angelo trained and drove harness horses for 50 years, not officially retiring until he was 90 years old. He was a World War II veteran, proudly serving from 1943-45 in Battery 252nd Field Artillery Battalion in Normandy, Northern France, Belgium and Central Europe.

Bob Lippiatt, 73, of Beloit, OH and Pompano Beach, FL

died June 18. He followed his father, Ike, into the harness horse business over 50 years ago. He remained continuously active with Standardbreds as a trainer and driver until two weeks before his death, except for a stint in the Army during the Vietnam war. Bob raced horses at Northfield Park and many Ohio

county fairs during the summer; and worked on the track crew at Pompano Park during the winters.


Ed McNeight died May 24. Ed loved his home in Florida and his pontoon boat. He was proud of his family and supported his children in all their endeavors. Ed's son, Ed Jr, is a longtime Meadows Owner, Trainer, Driver and Breeder.

Maryann Merriman, 82, died May 26. Maryann was the Northville Downs receptionist for 40 years. She was also a receptionist at South West Medical Arts. She always had a smile on her face, and was one of the most kind, caring and sincere people you could ever meet.



Robert Molaro, 69, of IL, died June 15. Bob was instrumental lobbying on behalf of horse racing in Illinois. Hawthorne President and CEO Tim Carey said, "Bob sought to build consensus, to lead with the best possible ideas and to provide relief with humor and humility. Always the optimist and always the storyteller, Bob shared a clear and exciting vision for the future of Illinois horseracing with anyone who would listen."

Patrick Allen Pierson, 69, died June 20. Patrick grew up on a farm and was an animal lover which led him to his career as a harness racing trainer/driver. He was an accomplished trainer and traveled the country. He was also a taxi cab driver which he loved, especially meeting people.



Harry Rutherford, 85, died June 11. Harry operated Cool Creek Farm in Mount Pleasant, Ontario with partner Diane 'Joey' Ingham for decades. He was a longtime harness racing industry participant and one of Canada's most successful Standardbred breeders. He served on numerous industry boards over the years.



Robert Harold Sampson, 74, of Croswell, MI, died June 23. Bob has been licensed with the USTA since 1966. He was a trainer and driver who spent his life with the horses. He was a veteran of the U.S. Army.



Nate Smucker died May 30 leaving his pregnant wife, Becca, and three children Alex (4) Mia (3) & Maddy's (1). Please keep them in your prayers. Nate is Greg Gehman's son-in-law.
