The Praise Privilege By Chaplain Sam Spence



We are in a spiritual battle. The Apostle Paul makes this very clear in the statements below that he wrote to the church at Corinth, as well as those he scribed to the church at Ephesus: "For

we do wrestle against flesh and blood, but against principalities, against powers, against the rulers of darkness of this age, against spiritual hosts of wickedness in the heavenly places." (Ephesians 6:12)

Paul goes on to explain putting on the whole armor of God, which includes your waist girded with truth, the breastplate of righteousness, feet shod with preparation of the gospel of peace, shield of faith, helmet of salvation, sword of the spirit (God's Word), and praying in the spirit.

One weapon – actually a vehicle – which incorporates our full armor is *praise*; it can be one of the most effective ways of putting the enemy on the run..."Resist the devil and he will flee from you." (James 4:7) Resist is an active verb, not a passive one. When we begin to praise the Lord in the midst of a trial, temptation, or contrary circumstance, we (in football terms) suddenly take an offensive position rather than a defensive one. He is the main resident farrier for all the big Raleigh horse shows (Tanglewood). He spends weekends doing that and he's very well paid for it! Matt also has a part

They also owned and operated Rock Valley Sales Co, a livestock auction barn. He was an accomplished auctioneer, sold real estate and actively raised, trained and drove Standardbreds. John announced many races and was a presiding judge for Iowa fair racing. He taught Sunday School at Faith Reformed Church in Rock Valley and was active with Hope Haven International Ministries.

Alan "Scottie" Harris, 84, of West Paducah, KY, died Nov 7. Scottie was well known on the Kentucky racing circuit. He was also a former president of Kentucky Harness Horseman Association, where he was inducted into the Hall of Fame. In his younger years, he played semi-professional baseball.

Robert M. Kinsey, 66, Sr. of Clayton, DE, died Nov 19.

Bobby loved to own, train and drive Standardbred racehorses. He was a generous person who worked hard to make the horse business the best it could be. At 20, Bobby was considered the hottest young driver on the circuit. In 1988 Bobby claimed "Leading Trainer" at Brandywine Raceway and "Leading Driver" at Dover Downs.

Donald A. Knapton, 77, of Westbrook, ME, died Nov 6. Donald started following the races in high school at Gorham Raceway. He went on to serve as race secretary at Windsor Raceway in Ontario and then Dover Downs in Dover, Delaware.

Sister Mary Joseph, APB, 85, of the Sisters of the Precious Blood, died Sep 29. She was a Civil Service Secretary before entering religious life in 1963. Mindy Smith used to forward her newsletters on to Sister. Eventually, sister became a CHHA member herself and was happy to know that there are many faithful

horsemen in the world. The Sisters of the Precious Blood will continue to pray for all our members.

Waldo "Wally" McIlmurray Jr, 64, died Nov 19. Wally was a talented hockey player who had the opportunity to play professional hockey. Instead, he chose to spend his life doing what he loved, training and driving horses. It was a lifelong passion of Wally's since childhood.

Fredericktown, PA, died Oct 23. John was a familiar face at The Meadows for many years. He followed in his father's footsteps to make lawyering his vocation. However, he also owned, bred, trained, and drove horses

Steven L. Perkins, 59, of Hilliard, OH, died Nov 10. Steven owned and trained Standardbreds. He also had a fair license. He loved spending time with family, playing cards and board games, watching TV, and was an avid movie trivia buff.

She enjoyed time with her family, vacationing in Florida where she and Donnie decided to call home several years ago. Ronald E. Ralph, 91, of Waldoboro, ME, died Nov 24. Ron and his sister, Helen, owned Ralph Chevrolet for 40-plus years. As an avid harness racing fan and owner, Ron was

president of Lewiston Raceway for over 20 years and a director of the New England division of the USTA for over 50 years. He was voted to the New England Horsemen Hall of Fame in 2011.
