It Gets Easier By Chaplain Lee Alphen

Have you ever said, "If only this colt realized things would be much better for him if he stopped fighting, calmed down and learned to pull the jog cart"? It's no fun being the villain, trying to make our young horses do what they do not want to do. We know they were born to race. Once they get the hang of it, it gets easier and they will love it.

I can remember my grandfather saving it hurt him more than us as he


Jesus knew His disciples would face temptations that night and that, if they gave in to sleep, they would be very sorry later. It was for their own good that He wanted them to stay awake and


Our horses love racing. They love winning and going to the winner's circle. They love being part of a stable that loves them, pays attention to them and takes good care of them.

My parents and grandparents loved my brothers and me and raised us right. I am blessed to be part of my family. Perhaps you have family members or good friends who are a special blessing



Dr Albert Gabel, 91, died April 12, 2021. Dr Al served on the faculty at Ohio State's College of Veterinary Medicine for 33 years. He served as head of the Clinical Equine Section from 1971 until he retired in 1989. He trained and drove Standardbreds for 11 years and was named the United States

Amateur Driver of the Year in 1995. He was elected president of the Ohio Standardbred Owners and Breeders Association in 1992 and was instrumental in initiating its merger with the Ohio Harness Horsemen's Association.

Martha Jean Gale, 80, of North Hanover, NJ, died May 5. She earned her business and equitation degree from Southern Seminary in Virginia. Martha and her husband, Earle, moved to North Hanover, NJ and purchased Gales Way Farm which they operated together for 53 years. She was dedicated to her Quarter Horses and Standardbred racehorses and spent her time horse training, giving lessons and running the farm.

Calvin Douglas "Doug" Lasher, 74, of Hanover, MD, died April 5. His hard work ethic, drive, and proud patriotism led him to enlist in the Air Force and serve his country in the Vietnam War. As a Field Engineer he was part of Apollo 11 with NASA and later worked for Raytheon as a Government Contractor. Doug was a businessman at heart and had a business racing, breeding and raising trotters. He was an elder at the Living Water Community Church.

Joseph J. Latella, 87, of Utica, NY, died April 12. Joe's life revolved around four things, family first (especially Rosemary), his work, boxing and horseracing. Joe and his brother, Phil, started Utica Excavating Co as a family business. Joe was trained as a boxer and was a Golden Gloves lightweight champion. Joe owned and trained horses racing at Vernon Downs.

Ronald Leslie MacArthur of Summerside, Prince Edward Island, died April 25.

Cynthia Milano, 62, of Saratoga, NY, died April 10. She was the wife of Barry Segel, and the team made an impact at Saratoga Raceway. She will be remembered as one of the foundation trainers at Saratoga. In 2014 she was named Horsewoman of the Year at Saratoga.

Richard P. Paltani, 83, of Sagamore Hills, OH, died Dec 5. Richard owned and bred harness horses since 2002. In total he owned 90 Standardbreds having bred about 20 of them. He still owned 20 horses at the time of his passing.





Wayne Dean Plowman, 83, of Keosaugua, IA, died April 14. After serving in the US Army, Wayne farmed for a few years and then embarked on a 40 year career training and driving harness horses. He was inducted into the Iowa Harness Horsemen's Hall of Fame. Upon his retirement, he proudly turned his stables over to his son, Eric. He enjoyed horses, fishing, camping and spending time with family, especially his grandchildren and great-grandchildren.


Betty Jo Sherman, 85, formerly of Elmore, OH, died May 3. Betty Jo and her husband, Daryl, are long-time Standardbred owners, and Daryl is a past president of the Ohio Harness Horsemen's Association. Betty Jo worked in the office for Daryl for many years and was a homemaker. She was a member of Grace Lutheran Church, Fremont. She also played the organ for many years at Grace Lutheran Church in Elmore. She was member of the Republican State Central Committee and was also a past member of the Woodville Board of Education.

Dr Paul B Smith, 85, of Plainfield, IL, died April 19. Dr

Smith served as the veterinarian for harness Racing for the Illinois Horse Racing Board for 27 years and was inducted into the Illinois Harness Horsemen's Hall of Fame, which was the group that he regulated. Dr Smith was also appointed by both Gov Edgar and Gov Thompson as Commissioner on the Illinois Racing Board.



Keith Waples, 97, of Ontario, died May 7. Keith drove and won his first Standardbred race at the age of 12 in 1935 at Sundridge, ON. His yellow and blue silks last appeared in a race when he was 81 in 2005, but he continued to train a few horses until just a few years ago. He and James Keeling pioneered Orangeville Raceway, Cloverdale Raceway (now Fraser Downs)



Lewis W. Whitaker Jr, 90, of Schnecksville, PA, died

April 14. Lewis was the founder and Chief Executive Officer of Whitaker Roofing & Siding Inc. until 1996. He was a member of Union Evangelical Lutheran Church, Schnecksville. He was a harness racing fan for many years and claimed his first horse 11 years ago. Then he purchased Scirocco Farm and raced several top horses with the farm surname.

Thomas W Burke, of Ringtown, PA, died April 9. Tom was also a US Navy pilot and served at the Naval Air Station, Pensacola Florida. He was a tool and die maker\machinist by trade. Tom was a member of St Mary's Roman Catholic Church in Ringtown. He was CHHA member Tara Burke's dad.





Vincent (Vinnie) J Boido Jr. 63, of Zephyrills, FL, died April 18. When Vinnie was 22, he earned his presiding judge's license from the USTA and became the youngest judge in the state of Michigan at the age of 22. Vince loved to



judge at the county fairs. He also owned several harness horses over the years. He owned his own car parts company in New Hudson, Michigan, RBI Industries.

Robert Ernest Cork, 78, of East Windsor, CT, died April 23. Robert loved to write and tell stories. He published a book about a harness-racing family, "A Chance to Win," in serial form in *Hoof Beats* magazine. He loved music and played the trombone in a church orchestra.
