Hay and Seeds By Chaplain Lee Alphen

Don't you love the smell of fresh alfalfa! I sure do! The horses like it too. However, we know not to give them too much of this rich, green hay before they get used to it.

Good hay crops take planning and proper care to insure proper nutrition. According to the University of New Hampshire Extension, "Hay quality depends on how the hay was harvested, handled, and stored. [...] When purchasing hay, you can get a general sense of its quality with a visual evaluation. [...] While a visual appraisal will help you identify poorquality hay, it won't help you assess its feed value. For an accurate measurement of nutrient content, you need a laboratory forage analysis." Weeds also can be a problem in hay. Some weeds are toxic.

"The Kingdom of God is like a farmer who scatters seed on the ground. Night and day, while he's asleep or awake, the seed sprouts and grows, but he does not understand how it happens" (Mark 4:26-27 NLT).

Here is New England, trees are dormant in the winter. Frozen ground and lack of water keep the roots from growing. Longer sunny days with higher temperatures spur new growth. Gradually we begin to see bits of color as new leaves start to pop out of the branches. Crocuses are the first flower to break open the ground and push up their pretty heads.

Farmers plant their crops and may check their growth. However, they don't actually see them grow. In the same way, we spread seeds of faith by the way we live our lives and share the gospel message. We share it here and

there with different people in different ways but don't really know if our seeds of faith have taken root.

We don't need to know. Just as we can't tell how nutritious hav is by looking at it, we are not able to see into the souls of others. It's not up to us to judge another person's faith. Like the trees and flowers that grow unobserved. so do the seeds of faith we sow. Like too much alfalfa, too much nagging is not good.



Our responsibility is to share the Gospel wherever, however and whenever God asks us to. Good seed is born from a life of faith and trust in God. Once our seeds are planted, God, the good farmer, gives the growth (1 Corinthians 3:6). As these seeds grow, they nourish the faith of others by sharing their own seeds.

A day will come when God will decide the crop on earth is ready for harvest (Revelation 14:15). Will we be ready? What will we have to show for our life in this world? Will our seeds turn to moldy, weed-filled brown grass or rich green alfalfa? My prayer is for us all to yield a harvest of Christians inspired by our faith to encourage others in their relationship with the Lord. As we celebrate Easter this month, let's remember that, with His resurrection, Jesus became the seed of eternal life. Happy Easter!

Deborah Ann Bisonic, 68, of Cream Ridge, NJ, died Feb 12. Deborah was a Standardbred horse trainer, a former luncheonette owner and veterinary assistant.

Alfred Joseph De Simone, 93, of Monticello, NY, died Jan 30. Alfred first came to Monticello while driving for the Intercity Bus Line with his brothers and his father. Later he established De Simone Bros. Horse Transportation with his brother Joe. He was a racehorse owner and served as president of the Monticello Harness Horsemen's Association for many years. In his later years, De Simone Bros.

Horse Transportation focused on shipping hay.

Dr. Isabel H. "Tibby" Hunt DVM, 71, of South Wales, NY, died Feb 11. Tibby was a lifelong horsewoman. She began fox hunting as a child then moved to show jumping and became a Grand Prix rider. Later she became a veterinarian at the University of Prince Edward Island. She was especially skilled in the areas of homeopathy, acupuncture and chiropractic. Eventually, she met and married Dr. Robert Hallick with whom she shared a happy and busy life at their farm in South Wales, NY.

Patrick Joseph Michael McGorisk, 86, died Feb 19. Joe

started his harness racing career at the Michigan tracks. He was a marketing genius, operational director, admissions director and ended his career as senior vice-president at Windsor Raceway. Many looked to him as a mentor as his guidance was a springboard to their successful career paths. He had a very strong faith, and the deepest love for his wife, Susie, and all of his family.

Charles "Terry" Provost, died Feb 6. Terry served as the Racing Secretary for several Canadian Standardbred tracks. He was quoted as saying that there was never a day that he did not want to go to work! From horse owner and the "worst groom ever (his words)," he became Racing Secretary and later an Ontario Racing Commission Judge at a number of Canadian tracks.

Dennis Allen Reed, 81, of South Solon, OH, and formerly of Washington Court House, Ohio, died Feb 5. He proudly served his country in the United States Army. Reed worked as a horse trainer for most of his life and retired from Midland Acres. He enjoyed



being with his family and had a passion for training. Larry L. Smith, 72, died Feb 4. Larry was a trusted

blacksmith working all over the state of Michigan. He raced ponies before graduating to Standardbred racing. He had many memorable horses and drives over the years. He set, and still holds, multiple track records around the state. He was part of a rare triple dead heat with Skyway Jaylo in 2018.

Roger D. Smith Jr, 83, of Old Orchard Beach, ME, died Feb 10. After graduation, he joined the U.S. Air Force serving as air traffic controller. Roger had a lifelong dedication to both Standardbred and Thoroughbred horse racing, serving in many capacities as an official and in management for over 50 years. Roger was a CHHA member and kept Chaplain Lee

updated on the people in Maine.

Marion C. Sumpf, 67, of Millsboro, DE, formally of Millstone, NJ, died Feb 12. Marion, began her life with the horses as a teenager working with Thoroughbreds at Delaware Park before eventually owning and training a stable of Standardbreds. She also worked as a vet assistant with Dr. Churchill of Chesapeake City, Maryland and Dr. Charles Moore. Marion was a huge advocate of rescuing animals. She spent many years fostering feral cats and dogs and finding them the perfect forever homes.

John F. Swart Jr, 96, died Jan 28. John was a heavily decorated World War II veteran and a successful Virginia

decorated World War II veteran and a successful Virginia CPA and business man. He was a Standardbred owner and breeder for over 50 years and campaigned many Stakes winning trotters.

Helen Ann Tuccillo, 77, of Prospect, CT, died Jan 19. Helen worked tirelessly alongside her husband as they started and ran their successful businesses. First came General Borings of Waterbury, which was a construction company that grew to serve industrial, commercial and residential needs. Then in 1976, the pair entered into harness


racing and that turned into their lifelong passion. Amelia Williams, 62, of DeLeon Springs, formerly of Bell, FL, died February 5. Amelia was the main stay in the stable for about 30 years. She and her husband, Bob, stabled at Bell in the winter then raced at many tracks around the country but mostly in Florida, Michigan and Illinois. Over the years, they've bred over 50 horses and owned about 100. They named a couple of the babies after Amelia.

Harley J Yoder, 88, of Goshen, IN, died February 5. Harley was a Hall of Fame owner, trainer and driver in the Harness Racing industry. He was also a breeder. He was a past President of the Elkhart County Trotting and Pacing Horse Association.


