

He loved spending time with family and friends. Theodore Wesley "Wes" Fisher, 85, of Middletown, NY and Montague, NJ, died April 27. For many years, Wes owned and operated several businesses in the northern New Jersey area. The most prominent was Rozewood Pet Foods located in Montague, N.J. which served many horse farms in the tri-state area. Wes was instrumental in the development, construction and management of the Mark Ford Training Center in Middletown, N.Y., where he operated his feed business for the last several years.

Stanley Oscar Hathaway Jr, 81, of Greenville, NC, died May 12. Stanley owned, trained and drove Standardbreds throughout his life. After traveling the world with the United States Navy, he continued his adventurous career as an owner of two motorcycle dealerships. He had a passion for racing, especially sports cars, motorcycles, dirt bikes, boats, and horses. Later, he built, developed and

owned a marina where he raced sailboats. William "Rick" Hartman, 64, of Tarlton, OH, died April 29. Rick was second trainer for his father in the Billy Jack stable where he broke and trained many nice horses. Later, Rick and his wife, Tami, owned, bred, and raced their own trotters. Tami served as second trainer for the stable. Their daughter, Kaitlin, joined them making the Hartman stable a truly family affair. When a driver sat behind one of Rick's trainees, they knew it would be well

Charles "Jack" LeDiard, 80, of Grove City, OH, died April 19. Jack was a union sheet metal worker. He drove and trained Standarbreds with his wife, Vickie, for 38 years. He loved harness racing and traveling to the county fairs and raceways. Jack was a strong willed, independent man who lived life on his own terms. He enjoyed and appreciated the simple things in life. His daughter, Becky Burchett, is a CHHA member.

Alex Michael LaFountaine, 25, of Galena, MD, died April 29 as the result of an automobile accident. He furthered his education at Frostburg University and worked as a horse trainer at Winbak Farm for the past four years. He enjoyed NASCAR, wrestling and horses. His parents, Moe and Jennifer, both own Standardbreds. Moe is a trainer, driver, starter and patrol judge. Jennifer is a presiding judge.

David Curtis Lough, 61, of Mechanicsburg, OH, died May 10. Together with his wife, Amy, father, son and

brother, David, owned, trained and drove Standardbreds. After earning a degree in Sports Science, he coached high school baseball and softball. He owned a pizza shop, worked for I-Supply as a salesman and worked 26 years for the State of Ohio Madison Correctional Institution. He was a member of the River of Life Christian Center.

Randy McCown, 63, died May 5. Randy was the Farm Manager at Blue Moon Rising Standardbred Breeding Farm in upstate, NY. He has been a USTA member since 2002. Randy was also an accomplished welder.

Nick Mouw, 69, of Crete, IL, died. He was an Iowa native and a regular on the Buffalo/Batavia circuit until he and his mother moved to the Chicago area where he campaigned a small stable until 1995. He left the horse business, but eventually returned as a farrier for the last five years. He was the son of the late Nick and Edith Mouw, both lifelong trainers and drivers.

Ross "Rosco" Siddall, 81, died May 2. Ross lived a fulfilling life devoted to his family and horses. Working as a blacksmith for 65 years, his work ethic was nothing short of extraordinary. He spent his free time outdoors surrounded by his beloved animals. Ross's son, Ryan, is CHHA member, Jo-Dee Brown's blacksmith.

Larry Virgil Tinch, 67, of Franklin, OH, died May 8. Larry was an owner, trainer, and driver of harness horses. He also enjoyed golfing and playing cards.

Rose G Travis, 83, of Galloway, OH, died May 11. Rose and her husband, Gib, maintained the snack bar in the Scioto Downs race paddock. She was also the race secretary for the Franklin County Fair for numerous years. George Harrison Walters, 86, of Gloversville, NY, died

May 4. George worked at General Electric in Schenectady, NY. He spent 40 years as an owner and trainer of Standardbreds with a stable at Saratoga Raceway. During the 1980s he established Bahia Mar Acres, a 100-acre boarding and broodmare farm in Broadalbin.

Tom Wilburn, II, 96, of Smith Oaks, MS, died July 27, 2015. After serving in the Army Air Corp during World War II, he returned to farming at Smith Oaks. He became a harness horse trainer and driver, a successful commercial cattle farmer and was named Mississippi Cattleman of the year in 1991. He was well known as an artist, story teller and colorful personality. Dr. Jeannine K. Smith wrote and published

the book, "Tales of Tom Wilburn."

Elmer N. Ballard, 87, of Gorham, ME, died April 28. Elmer owned a convenience store and worked in the Hartland Tannery. He also bought wood lots and cut wood for a living. He owned, trained and drove Standardbreds in Maine at

Lewiston, Scarborough Downs, and several fair tracks. Elmer was recently inducted into the New England Harness Writers Association Hall of Fame.

Dr. J. Glen Brown, 88, died May 13. He was veterinarian for the fledgling ABC Farms started by Elgin and Ted Armstrong in Brampton, Ont. He would go on to become General Manager, President and eventually Chairman of the Board of the world-class breeding facility in Inglewood, Ont. He retired from the Armstrong Board in 2005 after nearly 47 years with the company. He



was a member of the Canadian Horse Racing Hall of Fame and U.S. Harness Racing Hall of Fame and served on various racing commissions, and horse racing organizations.

Dana Ward Childs, 71, of Westbrook, ME, died May 4. Dana followed in the steps of his family, starting with his great-grandmother, Josephine Hendrickson, his grandfather, Dana E. Childs, and his father, Dana White Childs, pursuing a career as an owner/trainer/driver of Standardbreds. After raising their children, Dana and his late wife, Sandi, built their dream horse farm, Dansan Farm, in Saco, ME, close to Scarborough Downs.

A solid bay Quarter Horse gelding who stands about 14-1 hands, Smarty (registered name, Hickory Smart) is the love of my wife's life when it comes to horses. Marge won five saddles and over 25 buckles



in team penning and ranch sorting in the 6-7 years she competed on Smarty throughout Texas and Oklahoma. They were a formidable team.

Due to back surgery and a hip replacement, Marge had to guit riding a little over four years ago. She's starting to get back in the saddle again, but even if she doesn't make it back to the competition arena on Smarty (now 22), that little bay gelding will remain on the Spence spread until he takes his last blade of grass. Smarty is family. And even though this little Quarter Horse often provokes me by not allowing me to catch him in the pasture (I have to hem him up in a stall to get a halter or bridle on him), he's still family. Marge is the only one who can catch Smarty in the pasture, although I'm the one who feeds him out there every morning! If you are a born-again child of God, you're family. And even if you have some undesirable habits (even some addictions you're struggling with), you're still part of the family of God...and don't let the devil or anyone else tell vou any different!
