The colt born in an ordinary stable

and raised in a non descript town by an average family was thought to be nothing special.



However, when

people came from surrounding areas to watch him as he began his career, they were impressed. They were drawn to him and rooted for him.

Sold and abused, he disappeared for a while. The jealous people who saw him as competition, the naysayers, the hecklers and those who thought they were smarter than the rest were happy. Of course, his fans were heartbroken.

Then, miraculously, he was back but just shipped in a few times and was seen in different places. But, wow! His abuser must have sold him. Evidently, some good people got hold of him and took care of him. He looked incredible! He held his head high and was very sure of himself. He could not be beat.

Researching his bloodlines, his fans found a world-class heritage. Actually, this whole turn of events seemed supernatural.

Finding the empty tomb, Jesus' mother and followers did not know what to do. Jesus had appeared briefly to Mary Magdalene. Some angels gave a message about His resurrection to some of the women, and Peter and John also saw the empty tomb (Luke 24:1-12, John 20:1-8).

As the group of disciples were gathered in a house in Jerusalem, Jesus appeared in their midst and showed them his wounds. Thomas was not with them on that occasion. Later, when they told him what had happened, he refused to believe until he saw the wounds for himself (John 20:19-20, 24-25).

Jesus came again while the eleven were all there. He told Thomas to put his hands in his nail marks and in his side where it was pierced and to believe. Thomas then exclaimed, "My Lord and My God!" (John 20:26-28).

We might be kicking ourselves that we did not recognize the potential of a young colt. Hopefully, though, we would be happy for him and his stable. We may have missed out on an opportunity to buy him or bet on him. But, other than that, there is no harm done.

Reflecting on this success, he said, "Barbara is not only my backbone, she's my heart and soul. I'm only as great as she made me." Don was CHHA member, Bette Jean Calice's brother.

Harold S. Duris, 92, of Ocala, FL, and previously from

Michigan, died April 1. Harold began his career as a CPA. In 1984 he became executive vice president and general manager of Michigan's Hazel Park Harness Raceway. 18 years later, he became the executive vice president and general manager at Pompano where he remained until he retired in 1995.




Theodore Wesley "Wes" Fisher, 85, of Middletown, NY

and Montague, NJ, died April 27. For many years, Wes owned and operated several businesses in the northern New Jersey area. The most prominent was Rozewood Pet Foods located in Montague, NJ where it served many horse farms in the tri-state area. He was instrumental in the development, construction and management of the Mark Ford Training Center in Middletown, NY, where he operated his feed business for the last several years.

Osvaldo Formia, 83, died April 9. Osvaldo came to the

United States from Argentina. He worked for Hall of Famer Howard Beissinger. After starting his own stable, Osvaldo enjoyed a successful partnership with the Antonacci family's Lindy Farms and Lindy Racing Stable. Lindy Farms posted on Twitter, "He truly loved the horses and was a gifted horseman. We have many great memories with Osvaldo, and he will live on through his



Adrian W. Kent, 68, of DeLand, FL, died March 25.

Adrian was a professional geologist, working in 50 states and internationally since his graduation from Florida State University until his death. He was Baptist and enjoyed music, rock hunting, boating and fishing. Adrian's wife, Sandy Weiss of the Spring Garden Ranch, is a CHHA member.



Olle Goop, 78 of Sweden, died recently. Olle is a Hall of Famer who was best known in North America when he drove the older trotting mare Grades Singing to victories in the 1987 and 1989 Breeders Crown Mare Trot. He won 66 driving titles in Sweden during his career but was known as a consummate horseman. Between training and driving, he won almost all of Europe's trotting classics. He was inducted into the Swedish trotting Hall of Fame in 2013.

Marvin Owen "Tuffy" Mathias, 77, of Assumption, IL,

died April 21. Tuffy was the owner and operator of Owen Mathias Trucking for many years and a former farmer. He also owned and bred several Standardbred harness race horses in his lifetime and was an avid fan of harness racing which he watched every day on TV. He was a member of Locust Grove Church of rural Assumption.



Kevin D. Murray, 61, of Carver, MA, died April 20. Kevin trained owned and bred Standardbreds while his wife, Linda, became one of the leading female amateur drivers in New England. He and his family developed world champion and Grand Classic-winning American Miniature Horses over the past 15 years.



Michael Pisko Jr, 87, of Freehold, NJ, died April 12. Michael, an original member of the Standardbred Owners Association of New Jersey, was a driver, trainer, and owner of harness horses until his retirement in 1971.



Philip Von Borries, 74, of Lexington, KY, died March 24.

Philip was an author who published multiple books on both baseball and horse racing. He was a frequent visitor at Louisville Downs and the Red Mile early in his career and was awarded the inaugural John Hervey Award for writing about harness racing. He wrote about horse racing for numerous American, Canadian and European publications, among them *Hoof Beats*.



**Betty Wilson**, 86, of Fort Wayne, IN, died April 16. Betty worked at GM as an engineer. After retirement, she enjoyed reading and helping her husband train Standardbreds.


