The Goal Is the Hall of Fame By Chaplain Lee Alphen

Your colt dashes away from you, not wanting to be caught. Frolicking in the field with the other youngsters is too much fun, and he is the leader of the pack. Besides, he doesn't know your plans. This colt has a mind of his own.

So did Jezebel, the wife of King Ahab of Israel. Jezebel convinced Ahab to worship the pagan god, Baal. He built an altar and temple to honor Baal, leading the entire nation into the sin of idolatry, the worship of false gods.

Jezebel had God's prophets killed. The prophet Elijah feared for his life and was looking for a good place to hide. He went crying to God who sent him to confront Ahab. Elijah told Ahab that he was a servant of the God of Israel and that there would be a total drought for the next few years. He said it would rain again when, by the power of God, he commanded the rain to fall (1 Kings 17:1).

God sent the ravens to feed Elijah while he was hiding out by a brook. Then the brook dried up, and God sent him to a widow in Zarephath. When he arrived, he asked the woman for bread and water. She said there was only enough flour and oil for one more small meal for her and her son, and then they would die. Elijah told her not to worry and assured her that her flour and oil would last until the rains came. "So the woman did as Elijah asked, and God kept the promise Elijah made to her." (1 Kings 17:2, 8-16 NIV).

The widow's son became ill and eventually stopped breathing. She said to Elijah, "What do you have against me, man of God? Did you come to remind me of my sin and kill my son?" (1 Kings 17:17-18 NIV).

Elijah took the boy from her arms, carried him to the upper room where he was staying and laid him on his bed. Then he cried out to the Lord, "Lord my God, have you brought tragedy even on this widow I am staying with, by causing her son to die?" Then he cried out to the LORD, "LORD my God, let this boy's life return to him!" (1Kings 17:19-21 NIV).

God listened to Elijah and miraculously the boy started breathing again. Elijah took him to his mother and said, "Look, your son is alive!" The woman knew then that Elijah was sent by God and spoke the truth (1 Kings:22-24 NIV).

In the third year of the drought God instructed Elijah to tell King Ahab that there would soon be rain. The king called Elijah the troublemaker of Israel. Elijah reminded him that he and his family were the troublemakers who worshipped images of Baal instead of obeying God's commands (1 Kings 18:1-2, 17-18)

At Elijah's request the king gathered all the Israelites and the 450 prophets of Baal at Mount Carmel. Elijah asked everyone, "How long will you waver between two opinions? If the LORD is God, follow him; but if Baal is God, follow him" (1 Kings 18: 21).

Elijah instructed the prophets of Baal to select a bull, cut it into pieces and lay it on the wood of their altar but not to set fire to it. Rather, they were to call on the name of their god. Then, when it was his turn, Elijah would do the same.

After the prophets prepared their sacrifice, they called on Baal for a good part of the day. Around noon, "Elijah began to taunt them. 'Shout louder!' he said. 'Surely he is a god! Perhaps he is



deep in thought, or busy, or traveling. Maybe he is sleeping and must be awakened.' So they shouted louder and slashed themselves with swords and spears, as was their custom, until their blood flowed. Midday passed, and they continued their frantic prophesying until the time for the evening sacrifice. But there was no response, no one answered, no one paid attention." (1 Kings 18:27-29 NIV).

Elijah then repaired the altar of the Lord and dug a trench around it large enough to hold about 24 pounds of seed. He arranged the wood, cut a bull into pieces and laid it on the wood. Then he said to the people, "Fill four large jars with water and pour it on the offering and on the wood" (1 Kings 18:32-33).

"Do it again,' he said, and they did it again. 'Do it a third time,' he ordered, and they did it the third time. The water ran down around the altar and even filled the trench" (1 Kings 18:34-35).

Then Elijah came forward and prayed, "LORD, the God of Abraham, Isaac and Israel, let it be known today that you are God in Israel, and that I am your servant and have done all these things at your command. Answer me, LORD, answer me, so these people will know that you, LORD, are God, and that you are turning their hearts back again" (1 Kings 18:36-37).

Then fire from God burned up the sacrifice, the wood, the stones, the soil and even the water. The people cried out, "The LORD—he is God! The LORD—he is God" (1 Kings 18:38-39).

Later Elijah said the rain was coming and sent the king on his way so he wouldn't get stuck in the mud. When Ahab told Jezebel everything Elijah had done, she was not happy and planned to have him killed (1 Kings 19:1-2).

Elijah fled and hid in the wilderness. While he rested, God sent angels to feed him. They then sent him to Horeb, the mountain of God, where he spent the night in a cave (1 Kings 19:5-9).

God told him to stand out on the mountain to wait for Him. It sounds like it was a very scary night. A powerful wind tore the mountains apart, shattering the rocks. Then there was an earthquake followed by a fire. God wasn't in the wind, the earthquake or the fire. Finally Elijah heard a gentle whisper, prepared to meet the Lord, and left the cave. (1 Kings 19:11-13).

Then a voice said to him, "What are you doing here, Elijah?" and, after listening to Elijah's concerns for his life, God gave him his next assignments (1 Kings 19:11-

13). Elijah continued his faithful service to God. Then, one day, fiery chariots and fiery horses showed up out of nowhere. They were magnificent messengers providing an incredible ride for Elijah straight to the glorious gates of heaven (2 Kings 2:11).



Your colt does not realize the exciting opportunities he has ahead of him at the track or that, if he does as you say, he may one day win many prestigious races, perhaps even the Hambletonian or the Little Brown Jug. He doesn't know that in a few years he could be inducted into the Harness Racing Hall of Fame.





After retiring, Bob focused on raising, training, racing and breeding Standardbred racehorses. Bob served as a director with the Ontario Harness Horse Association as well as Standardbred Canada.



Lvnn Fortna, 71, of Hudson, OH, died May 24, Lvnn was a Standardbred trainer and driver in the mid-Atlantic and upstate New York tracks. She learned the family business from her father, George, a well-known trainer-driver on the PA fair circuit and at tracks all over the East Coast. She served the industry in many positions, such as, patrol judge, paddock judge, assistant race secretary, stall superintendent and assistant GM. "My wife was the center of our universe, the anchor we thought would never give way. She exemplified the very best qualities that thrive and endure in the close-knit harness racing community. Lynn was born into it, cherished the people in it, and was grateful and proud to be part of it to her dying day" said her husband, Tom Aldrich.

Timothy Dale Heminger, 73, of Hawkinsville, GA, died May 29. Timothy raced Standardbreds for many years and was also a popular blacksmith. He enjoyed spending many winters in Hawkinsville both training and shoeing horses. He managed the Hawkinsville harness horse training facility for several years and then moved on to work as a supervisor of the water treatment plant for the City of Hawkinsville.



Jerry Michael Monahan, 82, of Lexington and Harrodsburg, KY, died May 31. Jerry worked at 18 different racetracks. He served as Vice-President and General Manager of Buffalo Raceway, Executive Vice-President and General Manager of the Lexington Trots Breeders Association (The Red Mile/ Tattersalls) and Senior Vice-President of




Colonial Downs. He established a first-ever horse auction by way of satellite over the North American continent. allowing buyers to bid on horses from coast to coast.

Randy McCown, 63, died May 5. Randy, a USTA member since 2002, was the Farm Manager at Blue Moon Riseing Standardbred Breeding Farm in upstate, NY.

Jacqueline "Jackie" Ann Price, 82, of Williamston, MI,

died April 28. Jackie was the wife of lifelong harness racing enthusiast, participant and retired harness racing executive Donald R. Price. She worked as the banquet manager of Williamston's Seahawk Restaurant and later as a bookkeeper at Crampton Realty. She was a woman of great faith, a devoted Catholic, and parishioner at St. Mary's Catholic Church in Williamston.




Ronald "Ron" Frank Sobczak, 75, of Oregon, OH, died June 15. Ron was a Longtime Raceway Park track announcer. He started his career as a DJ in Lima, Ohio, and then moved back to the Toledo area, where his voice could be

Paul Vance, 93, died May 30. Paul, born Joseph Paul Florio, was a world-renowned American songwriter, record producer and Standardbred harness racing owner. He was the co-writer of Catch A Falling Star, Itsy Bitsy Teenie Weenie Yellow Polkadot Bikini. His daughter, Paula Vance, said on her FaceBook page, "As sad as I am today, I have peace in knowing that in my Dad's last days and weeks of his life, he asked

Bob's interest in Standardbreds began as a teenager, and he ultimately trained and drove race horses at tracks from New York to Florida over a span of around 40 years. 





