Donald R. Brown, 96, died Aug 17. Donald enjoyed his profession as a horse trainer. He had two horses in the Little Brown Jug. He retired at age 80 after Marced Card raced in the Jug. He proudly

served in the United States Army during the Korean War. James V. Compton, 80, died Sep 13. James was a milkman in the days of home delivery, then as a machinist and finally at General Motors in Rochester. He became involved in harness racing at Batavia Downs and became a successful driver and trainer that competed at several tracks in upstate New York.

Dr John Findley, 97, of Carlisle, Ontario, died Aug 20. Dr

Findley spent four decades as a breeder, trainer, driver and veterinarian beginning when he was 13 with his first lifetime win. In 1975 he was the leading percentage driver in North America. He also captured 13 different driving titles at various racetracks during his career and was inducted into the Canadian Hall of Fame.

Lucien Fontaine, 83, died Sep 10. Lucien was elected in

July to harness racing's Hall of Fame. The Quebec, Canada native began his career as a groom for Keith Waples then came to the United States and worked for Clint Hodgins. In an era where the trainer-driver was prominent, he became one of the first "catch-drivers" amassing over \$21,000,000 in purses despite the fact that

his career was cut short in 1989 as a result of open-heart surgery. He was an innovator, helping to improve the future of all horsemen and racing while serving as a Vice President of the National Association of Harness Drivers and the Standardbred Owners Association of New York. He also served on a committee of the New York State Racing Commission ensuring equitable rules for horsemen.

Gregory Garland Garnsey, 59, of Blossvale, NY, died Sep 5. Greg trained and drove many horses throughout his career but the highlight was working with his dad, the late Hall of Famer, Glen Garnsey. He

was co-owner of Pepi's Pizza in Vernon for a while. In the early 2000's he worked with his stepmom, Paula, selling real estate in Florida. He returned to NY and was employed as a Food Service Director.

Frank A. Lomangino, 88, of Tinton Falls, NJ, died Aug 9. Frank co-founded Lindy Farms of New York with his

cousin, Guy "Sonny" Antonacci, and other family members. He established Lomangino Standardbreds in New Jersey and continued his interest in breeding horses. He owned broodmares and stallion shares and conducted business with major farms. Frank and his brothers established Allied Sanitation, and he

eventually started a few other businesses in NJ. Frank was a lifelong, devout parishioner at Holy Innocents Roman Catholic Church in Neptune, NJ.

Richard R Mays, 65, of Hamburg, NY, died Sep 7. Rich was a lifelong horseman who competed in western New York as an owner, trainer and driver. He was first licensed in 1973 at the age of 16 and competed at tracks across New York state ever since. He was actively racing right up until

the time of his passing. Larry Keith Noggle, 69, of Fairhope, AL, died on Aug 8. Larry raced the fair circuit, winning his first race when he was 16. He had a successful harness racing career stabled at Red Mile. He was top driver for several years. He retired from racing, moved to Marana, AZ where he was a general contractor. He enjoyed camping and riding ATV's.

Lewis Samuel Ramsburg, 70, of Rocky Ridge, MD, died Aug 19. Lewis was a lifelong farmer and horseman. He started racing ponies at an early age and later became a Standardbred horse owner, breeder, trainer and driver racing at tracks and fairs throughout the Mid-Atlantic area. He also enjoyed attending auctions were he would buy used farm equipment then resell to local farmers in the area. Even after his first health incident, he was still "wheeling and dealing" from his hospital bed.

Billy S. Tumey, 86, of Marion, OH, died Aug 21. Billy owned and trained harness horses and had his Matinee license. He truly enjoyed his time at the track. He was retired from Tecumseh in Marion where he worked for more than 20 years. He was a member of the Meeker United Methodist Church.

Janice Elaine Vellutato, 91, of Mickleton, NJ, died Aug 20. Jan had a stable of Standardbreds and also owned Harmony Acres Hoof Beats, a harness and tack shop in Mickleton. She worked for 35 years as a secretary in employee relations, assisting people in finding jobs. Janice admired John Wayne, Doris Day, Mary Tyler Moore and Frank Sinatra, but most of all her 1957 Ford T-Bird. Ted Wing, 74, died Sep 13. Ted was born into a Maine harness racing family. He was a natural in the bike and quickly became the leading driver in New England from

1970-75. The following year he made the move to the New York-New Jersey circuit to compete against the best in the business. His timing couldn't have been better as his move coincided with the opening of The Meadowlands Racetrack, where he drove in the first race there. Ted was inducted into harness racing's Hall of Fame in Goshen, NY in 2019. He won many driving titles

during his career. He was inducted into the New England Harness Writers Hall of Fame and the Maine Sports Hall of Fame.

Growing up he was an avid sportsman and had an opportunity to sign with the Dodgers, Giants, and Cardinals. Instead he signed with Uncle Sam and served his country as a proud marine. When



discharged from the USMC, he joined the Glen Rock Police Department. He also owned a couple of stone companies. Herman was an active member of Our Lady of Lourdes Catholic Church, very Pro-Life, loved the Lord with all his heart, freely sharing the Gospel with so very many people from all walks of life. Herm was a CHHA member who often called Chaplain Lee so they could pray with each other.
