REMEMBER, A SMALL LIGHT WILL DO A GREAT DEAL WHEN IT IS IN A VERY DARK PLACE.

YOU are the Light of the World By Chaplain Lee Alphen

It sure gets dark at night when we lose the power. Since we prefer the light, we automatically hit the light switches when we enter a dark room. Then we sadly remember: there is no light. Simple things like topping off the water buckets and making sure the horses are okay are much more difficult in the dark.

Darkness is great for sleeping and watching movies. However, we prefer the light for pretty much everything else. Many people use night lights. The clock's soft glow and the time projected on the ceiling help me find my way when I have to get up at night.

Darkness is the absence of light. In the beginning God created the sky and the earth in the midst of the darkness. Then He created light, separating it from the darkness, and called the light day and the darkness night (Genesis 1:1

Those who want to do evil generally prefer the darkness to cover their misdeeds. However, we are living in troubled times. Evildoers are becoming more brazen. They boast of their wrongdoings, calling them good while calling the good that others do evil. Jesus said to His disciples, "Do you have eves but fail to see, and ears but fail to hear?" (Mark 8:18 NIV).

God sent ten disasters to Egypt in an effort to get the Pharoah to free the Israelites, whom the Egyptians were using as slaves to build their pyramids. They did not respond to the first eight. Then God sent darkness so dark the Egyptians could not even see each other. They stayed put for three days. Of course, God made sure there was plenty of light where the Israelites lived.

Finally, after the tenth plague, Pharoah let God's people go.

Jesus carried the sins of all humanity to the cross with Him. While He hung on the cross on what we know as Good Friday, the sun stopped shining around noon. It was dark everywhere for about three hours (Luke 23:44-45).

As "the curtain of the temple was torn in two, Jesus called out with a loud voice, 'Father, into your hands I commit my spirit.' When he had said this, he breathed his last" (Luke 23:45-46).

Jesus overcame the darkness. Remember, "God is light; in Him there is no darkness at all" (1 John 1:5 NIV). He says to us, "You are the light of the world. [...]. Let your light shine before others, that they may see your good deeds and glorify your Father in heaven" (Matthew 5:14, 16 NIV).

We have a choice. We can follow the light and bring the peace, love and joy of the Lord to ourselves and those around us, setting an example for others to follow. Or we can live on in the darkness, separating ourselves from God and all that is good. "If we walk in the light, as He is in the light, we have fellowship with one another, and the blood of Jesus, His Son, purifies us from all sin" (1 John 1:7 NIV).

We check on the horses even when it is dark and make sure they have water. Do we check for dark areas in our lives as we strive to enjoy the fullness of life? Darkness cannot overcome the light (John 1:5). With God's help we can put aside our deeds of darkness and be filled with God's peace and blessings.

Let's ask ourselves what we would like to be called. Do we want to be called Christian, a follower of Christ? Or "a child of the devil and an enemy of everything that is right" (Acts 13:10 NIV)?

From Lucille Wick...


Her lung cancer is gone praise God!

Richard "Boots" Lee Awbrey, 70, of Nevada, OH, died November 25. Richard, known as "Boots", was an avid Horseman, who loved his family, friends and horses. He also worked at National Lime and Stone for over 30 years. He was an active member of the Bucyrus Nazarene Church.



Alfredo "Freddy" Collazo, 57, of Newtonville, NJ, died Dec 15. Freddy was a Standardbred horse trainer since the 1980's. He loved to go fishing and spend time with family and friends.

John C. Cisna, 73, of Springfield, IL, died Nov 10. John was a member of the Board of Directors of the U.S. Trotting Association for 42 vears and longtime Illinois horseman. He co-founded the Illinois Standardbred Owners and Breeders Association and at various times served as the group's president, a director and for the last 10 years as its executive director. He was a long-time vice-president of the Grand



Circuit and currently served as a Grand Circuit steward for the Illinois State Fair. He was also president and a director of the Review Association. "I knew John 60 years, since we were both 16," Phil Langley, president of the U.S. Trotting Association, said. "He did as much or more than anvone for Illinois harness racing. He was a great driver and trainer, and was always working to further the sport." Gilbert Donald, 86, of Philadelphia, MS, died Nov 26. Gilbert worked for Weyerhaeuser for over 40 years and in retirement for B & G Wood. He proudly served on the Neshoba County Fair Board, including 11 years as president. He was president and chairman of the Harness Racing Committee and was a USTA licensed starter for harness racing. Gilbert was a member of First United Methodist Church.

Alfred Z. Kowalewski, 89, of Bloomfield Hills, MI, died Nov 16. Alfred was a longtime horse racing fixture along with his partner Tekla Young. He owned hundreds of horses over his 40-plus-year racing career. His legacy will go on as The Kales Company, which managed his sizable stable and will carry on under the direction of his beloved

Gloria Myers, 77, of Greenwood, DE, died Dec 5. Gloria and her husband, Bobby, bought a beautiful farm where they raised their three children. They also had a racing stable and raced their horses in Ohio, Pennsylvania, New York and Indiana. She was a medical technologist (ASCP certified) at Allegheny General Hospital, in Pittsburgh and a member of Painesville United Methodist Church.



Robert Sidley, 87, of Painesville, OH, died Nov 24. Robert

and his wife, Polly owned and bred hundreds of harness horses over more than a half-century at Northern Farms in Painesville. They enjoyed racing their prodigies at county fairs and racetracks in Ohio, Pennsylvania, New York and Indiana. Today I want to share an experience from a couple of summers ago. One August day, having finished mowing my yard on my little John Deere tractor-mower (one of my favorite activities...I can make a "big showing" using very little energy), I proceeded to the trimming. This requires a lot more energy, and our yard comprised at least a half-acre.



Finishing up hot and sweaty, I proceeded to the easy chair in my bedroom, which sets in front of a nice fan. As I plopped down in the chair, a familiar scripture popped into my mind..."the joy of the Lord is your strength." (*Nehemiah 8:10b*) And it wouldn't leave!

Wondering why this particular scripture was on me so strong, I suddenly heard that Still Small Voice in my spirit: "Sam, do you know what My joy is...what gives Me true joy?"
