God's Second Choice

Have you ever lost horses to another trainer because you didn't do something the owner wanted? Or have you taken your horses away from a trainer who didn't do as you asked? You may have left someone you trusted to handle something for you and were very disappointed when they let you down. It is always sad to be either person.

Samuel delivered God's message to Saul, telling him to "go, attack the Amalekites and totally destroy all that belongs to them" (1 Samuel 15:3 NIV). This was because God didn't want to lose His people to the ways of nonbelievers.

Saul "took Agag king of the Amalekites alive. [...] Saul and the army spared Agag and the best of the sheep and cattle, the fat calves and lambs" (1 Samuel 15:8,9 NIV). They spared everything they thought was good. Saul blamed the soldiers for going against God and said his plan was to take the best of the plunder to offer as a sacrifice to God (1 Samuel 15:8-9, 15).

Evidently Saul thought he knew better than God what should be done and did not want to lose face with his soldiers whom he blamed. God was not at all happy with Saul. In fact, He was so unhappy, He rejected Saul as king and sent Samuel to Jesse of Bethlehem to anoint one of his sons as king (1 Samuel 16:1).

Jesse presented his seven oldest sons to Samuel but God rejected them all. Finally, at Samuel's urging they brought young David in from pasturing the sheep. The Lord told Samuel David was the one so Samuel anointed him with oil (1 Samuel 16:1-13).

God's spirit left Saul and an evil

spirit tormented him (1 Samuel 16:14). That can happen when we go against God. We don't always understand why God would want things done a certain way. However, God sees the big picture. We don't know all God knows.

We are sad when things don't work out with those we trust, especially when we know how great the opportunities would have been for that person if they had done as we asked. Perhaps we saw the big picture and because they didn't; they chose a different path.

About 700 years before Christ, the Israelites and their leaders disobeyed God by worshiping other gods and doing other things against God's commands. They even worshiped Baal and "sacrificed their sons and daughters in the fire. They practiced divination and sought omens and sold themselves to do evil in the eyes of the Lord, arousing his anger" (2 Kings 17:17 NIV). Because the Israelites disobeyed God, Hoshea the king of Assyria was able to capture Samaria and exile the Israelites to Assyria.

David was not God's first choice. But when His first choice failed Him, David stepped up and became a man after God's own heart because he did as God asked (1 Samuel 13:14). David was not perfect, but he owned up to his mistakes when he was in the wrong, turned back to God and accepted correction and punishment.

We are not perfect either and may not be God's first choice in a particular situation. But that really does not matter. What is important is that we do our best to follow God's instructions and, when we mess up, to own up to our mistakes, apologize to God and resume doing God's will as best we can. We may be happily surprised where this takes us.

clan, and the church congregation attested to what a remarkable man Lloyd was and the impact he had in encouraging them to trust in God.


William "Bill" Robinson, 78, of Washington CH, OH,





