Communicators

Flying around barrel racing's cloverleaf courses at break-neck speeds requires a good relationship with your horse. The late Sam McKee's wife, Christine, and daughter Lyndsey spend a good amount of time bonding with their new horses. Lindsey's horse Sophie is a gem and Chris loves her black four-year-old quarter horse, Rango. Let's pray for safety and lots of ribbons for them both.

When we have a good relationship with our horses, their ears go up and twitch, listening when they hear us coming. They are happy to have us scratch their favorite spots, feed them carrots and apples and just spend quality time with them. Dogs' ears perk up too when they hear their people's voices.

"It was a privilege to have Mary Jane be a part of the Meadows horse family for many years," said Rich Gillock, a past president of the Meadows Standardbred Owners Association. "She was a great worker and an even better person."

Alan J. Leavitt, 88, of Lexington, KY, died May 6. Alan



Richard Munk, 72, of Middletown, NY, died April 24. Richard and his wife, Karen, managed Funky Munky Stable, a popular fractional share ownership group based in New York that campaigned both Standardbred and Thoroughbred horses.

Alexander Donath Savran, 86, died May 11. Dr Savran

and his wife, Sharon, purchased a Standardbred Training and Racing Facility. Alex enjoyed sitting behind his own horses as an amateur driver. He had the claimer of the year in 1990. Dr. Savran was president of the Massachusetts Society of Dental Anesthesiology in 1974 and was proud to be a Big Brother.



Brock Christopher Schmaltz, 46, of Sunbury, OH, died




dad took him out of school to attend when he was a freshman in high school.

He and his wife, Sylvia, were named to the Little Brown Jug Wall of Fame. 
Trusting God in Today's Turmoil
