Give God the Glory

"It's not the least bit surprising that the first thing Jim Campbell does is thank and credit others for his berth in the Harness Racing Living Hall of Fame," writes Dave Briggs. "Class and integrity have been integral parts of the trainer's career from the beginning, along with equal doses of talent and work ethic," (Harness Racing Update [HRU], July 7, 2024).

I asked Hambletonian Society
Director of Publicity and COO, Moira
Fanning, what she thought of Jim and
his induction. "Horse racing is a very
tough business," she replied, "a roller
coaster of emotion, stress, endless work
and only sometimes, joy. To navigate it
successfully, especially over the long
run, you need tremendous support and
focus.

Moira noted that Jim Campbell "is quick to say how very much he leans on his family—and how he credits them for his success." His wife and son as well as his extended family "provide emotional balance and unconditional love." Jim "relies heavily on his faith and belief in God and doesn't hesitate to reference that support publicly."

In his introduction at the Hall of Fame event, Jim's brother John described Jim's most important trait as that "he always knows the right thing to do and he always does it, no matter how difficult that may be," recalls Moira. "His faith makes that reflexive." She added that "John called Jim not just a Hall of Fame trainer but a Hall of Fame human! He is so right about that."

Dave McDuffee of Rye, NH said, "It took a village to get me in this Hall of Fame. It wasn't me doing it, it was all of these other people around me" (Debbie

Little, HRU, July 7, 2024).

The apostle Paul shares the same sentiment as Jim and Dave, insisting that we Christians are all part of the Body of Christ. It is the same spirit of God working in each of us that brought us all together to accomplish God's work on earth. In a stable, each one of us has a job to do. If the horse doesn't get fed and watered, it will not race well. When one person in the shed row gets sloppy about their work, others may follow, thinking the bar has been lowered.

If we don't do our part by responding to the urgings of God, there will likely be a domino effect as others down the line make poor choices. Following our lead, they may also stop listening to God. "Work willingly at whatever you do, as though you were working for the Lord rather than for people. Remember that the Lord will give you an inheritance as your reward, and that the Master you are serving is Christ" (Colossians 3:23-24 NLT).

When we love and respect those around us, valuing them for who they are, do all that we do to the best of our ability and put God first in our lives, we offer a good witness. Jesus said, "You are the light that shines for the world to see. [...]. You should be a light for other people. Live so that they will see the good things you do and praise your Father in heaven" (Matthew 5:14, 16 ERV).

While watching the big races on TV, I am always happy when the winning jockey acknowledges God, giving Him the glory. I'm proud of the drivers who bless themselves or visibly pray while leaving the paddock for the post parade.

Living a godly life sets a good example for those around us. But, it's not enough. We must also give God the glory as Jim Campbell does.
