Opportunities & Blessings

Happy birthday to all the horses! Au revoir to the 14-year-olds! Bonjour to the 2-year-olds. We pray for health, safety, fun and rewards for all our horses as they step into the opportunities awaiting them in 2025.

Perhaps the elders will embark on new, less taxing careers with some very special people. Or, maybe their present owners will provide them with forever homes in lush green pastures to live out their days.

It will be an exciting year for the youngsters as they get outfitted like the older horses and head to the track. Some will even race. Others will train a bit, then head back to the pasture to grow bigger and stronger.

As we usher in the new year, let's consider the new opportunities available to us.

Jesus and His disciples were leaving Jericho when the blind beggar, Bartimaeus, heard Jesus was passing by. He called out to Jesus, asking for mercy. The people told him to be quiet, but Jesus said to call him. Bartimaeus threw his cloak aside, jumped to his feet, and went to Jesus (Mark 10:46-50).

Jesus asked him respectfully, "What do you want me to do for you?' He answered, 'Teacher, I want to see again.' Jesus said, 'Go. You are healed because you believed.' Immediately the man was able to see again" (Mark 10:51-52 ERV).

Notice that Bartimaeus didn't hesitate but jumped right up leaving his cloak behind. Then Jesus didn't just assume he wanted to see. He asked him what he wanted. Jesus also invites us to ask for what we want.

A woman who had been bleeding for twelve years heard about Jesus and

followed Him along in a crowd of people. She thought that if she just touched His clothes she would be healed. As soon as she did, her bleeding stopped (Mark 5:25 -29).

"Jesus immediately felt power go out from Him, so He stopped and turned around. 'Who touched my clothes?' He asked. [...] The woman knew that she was healed, so she came and bowed at Jesus' feet. She was shaking with fear. He said to her, 'Dear woman, you are made well because you believed. Go in peace. You will not suffer anymore" (Mark 5:30, 33-34 ERV).

After the woman was healed, she wanted to just sneak off unnoticed, but Jesus wanted to give her more. He wanted her to see and feel His love for her and to know she was right in coming to Him.

As we begin 2025, let's be like Bartimaeus and leave behind all the baggage of past years. Then, following the example of Bartimaeus and the woman, we can turn to Jesus in faith by trusting Him with our biggest needs and to help us overcome all that holds us hostage. Then with a fresh outlook we will be free to enjoy all the exciting opportunities that await us.

We are free to follow Jesus, praising God and trusting Him to work powerfully in our lives (Luke 18:43 NIV). Let's accept this great gift and enjoy all the blessings the new year has to offer.

Ken, 81, has

been racing horses since 1971. He began a well drilling business in Maryland in 1961. In 2006 a York, PA church group wanted to buy a drill from him to drill wells in Africa. Instead of just selling them the drill, Ken founded Lifetime wells for Ghana, now called Lifetime Wells International, and began making quarterly trips to drill wells himself. The drilling in Ghana is now done by a local team year-round. Ken drills wells in Tanzania during his trips. The drilling ministry has now installed 3,300 wells.

In 2018 God opened the door for Ken to start Lifetime Wells Vision after learning of the huge need in his mission field and hearing one of the scriptures about Jesus healing a blind man. This vision ministry has performed 15,256 surgeries, distributed 37,688 pairs of eyeglasses and offered 106,124 treatments.

God's horse, as Ken refers to JL Cruze, funds a big part of these important ministries. The 13-year-old recently set a track record for trotters at Rosecroft, bringing his lifetime earnings to just under two million dollars, all of which goes to Ken's well and vision projects. What his horses don't earn comes from Ken's personal funds and donations. It is especially hard for Ken to say "no" to providing opportunities to bless people with eyesight.

Chaplain Lee began the Racetrack Ministry at Rockingham Park in 1975. In the late 1990s many Mexicans working with the Thoroughbreds were part of this ministry. Lucas Benitez, his wife and father were from a village in south central Mexico. They told Lee they had no water during much of the year and invited her to visit when they went home. She did and seeing lots of fruit growing on trees figured there must be water in the mountains where they lived.

Lee contacted a non-profit well drilling organization in Texas and arranged for them to go and drill a well in Lucas' village. That village now has plenty of water. Plans are in place for the ministry to install another well in a nearby village in January. This mission also helps the local churches and provides food and scholarships.

Pastor Bob recently traveled to Malawi, Africa as the coordinator for the Orthodox Church's Isaiah 44 well drilling project. On the list of much needed areas for relief, Father Nicodemus was delighted to hear the project could now drill at the next two locations. If these two drilling efforts are successful, the total will come to nine wells.

Paul Randall Corey, 69, of Canonsburg, PA, died Oct 18. Paul kept his stable small, but his horses were always considered viable competitors in every race. He owned, trained, drove and bred harness horses. He was involved in numerous business ventures before going full time as a Standardbred trainer.

Thomas G. Daniel, 71, of Rochester Hills, MI, died Oct 29. Tom was the patriarch of his extended family and the one everyone turned to for advice on just about everything. Tom's brother, CHHA member Danny Daniel, said, "Tom was like a father to me. He was always there, the serious and mature one. I think he would want me to be that person now for my siblings and family. God will help me to do so. I will need His strength and pray for it earnestly." Tom was a very faithful Catholic who attended San Francesco Catholic Church.

William (Billy) Donofrio, 85, died Oct. 24. Billy raced many horses at Freehold Raceway, Monticello Raceway, Pocono Downs and others from 1960-2016. He was a trainer and a groom.

Daniel E. (Don) Gillis, 87, of Canada, died recently. Don was recognized as a competent and patient trainer, especially with younger horses. He had some very successful horses in his small stable in the United States and Canada.

David R. Goodrich, 88, of Peru, NY, died Oct 23. David and his wife, Melissa, opened a Standardbred breeding/racing stable and planned to retire doing that. When his daughter, Mary Aliss, became a trainer it became a family affair. Throughout his life he held a variety of finance related positions.

John Thomas Green, 89, of Spencer, TN, died Oct 29. John owned trained, drove and bred harness horses while he lived in Ohio for over 50 years. He was well known for his garden vegetables. John attended the Mooneyham Freewill Baptist Church.

Gerald Douglas Kilgore Jr, 81, died Nov 11. Gerald owned, trained, drove and bred harness horses. He was an extremely hardworking man and an excellent provider for not only his family, but also for whomever needed a little extra help. He ran a successful construction company, Kilgore's Construction, and served the Town of Paris as Selectman from 1994-2016.

Robert Mitchell, 84, of Smyrna, DE, formerly of Goldsboro, MD, died Oct 15. Robert owned and trained harness horses most of his life. He worked a while at Playtex and had his own roofing business.

George Paul Mueller, 87, of Litchfield, OH, died Oct 21. George worked as a lab and x-ray technician before becoming a Standardbred driver, trainer, owner and breeder. He trained locally at the Medina County Fairgrounds before moving his stable to his farm/track in Litchfield. He became a dear friend to the Amish community driving them places and fixing broken bikes for them to use. He was a member of Zion Lutheran Church.



William J Pocza, 62, of Pompano Beach, FL, died Sep 18. William drove and trained harness horses. His sister, Jody, said, "His knowledge and eye for horses, took us to the top! Rest in peace little brother."



Richard "Dick" Roadarmel, 87, of Bloomsburg, PA, died Sep 1. Dick trained 2 and 3 year-old fillies at the Bloomsburg Fairgrounds and worked at the farm from 1967 to 1982. After the sale of the horse farm, he began operating his own stable. During his life, he broke yearlings and was a fixture at the Harrisburg Standardbred Horse Sale. Before embarking on

his racing career, he taught for 5 years and

worked at U. C. Steele.

Paul A. Vacca, 89, of Norton, MA, died Nov 5. Paul owned, trained and drove harness horses. He was deeply involved in harness racing throughout New England, New York and New Jersey. He campaigned many horses in the Massachusetts Breeders Stake races through the



James Parnell "Jim" Redfern, 81, of Lebanon, KY, died Oct 16. Jim owned, trained and bred harness horses. He was a proud United States Navy Veteran.



Richard "Richie" Ringler, 67, died Oct 14. Richie was good at getting young horses to the races. This lead to a 16 year partnership with Mike and Pat LaChance. In 2021 he moved over to the official side of the business and became the starter for Harrington, Freehold and Vernon.

Roy J. Salute Jr, 64, of Clifton Heights, PA, died Oct 16.

Roy loved harness racing and owned several Standardbreds. He was a self-employed plumber, a longtime coach for the Clifton Heights PAL and volunteered as a coach for several teams through the years.

John E. Schmigel, 79, of Freehold, NJ, died Sep 26. John enjoyed a lifetime career in the Standardbred horse industry as an owner, trainer, driver, and most recently, horse transporter. John also served in the National Guard for ten years.

William "Bill" Leavitt Varney, 83, died Oct 11. In later years Bill was involved with harness racing and sire stakes breeding. His horses carried the "Pembroke" moniker referring back to caring for and racing horses with his grandfather. He was also a Commissioner of the Maine State Harness Racing Commission. During his lifetime he started, expanded and sold many businesses.

Roger Roland, 87, of Grinnell, IA, died Nov 7. Roger loved farming and horses. In 1967, Roger and Judy bought their first horse, marking the beginning of a cherished family involvement in harness racing. He lived on the family farm for 50 years where

he shared his passions and values with his loved ones. He was also a clerk of course at the fairs and a CPA. Roger's brother, CHHA member Royal Roland, also races horses.
