Spirit Filled

Wild horses are not afraid of fire, says William Simpson in a January 5, 2025 *Epoch Times* article. He reports that, while wildfires raged nearby, "wild horses grazed Agate Flat, which straddles the California-Oregon border. Their actions played an important role by reducing fuel and creating a fire break that helped suppress the speed and heat intensity of the blaze. This kept the fire from spreading."

Simpson goes on to say, "That was a critical point in the battle [...] that helped Cal Fire win the war. Thanks to the horses, we won."

Simpson "attributes the instincts of wild horses, whose ancestors have seen thousands of wildfires," to their ability to calmly graze near fire. An internet search found others who said the same thing. Perhaps these spirited horses see the clearing of the brush and old grass as their job for the preservation of their families.

John the Baptist preached in the wilderness, saying, "I baptize you with water for repentance. But after me comes one who [...] will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and fire" (Matthew 3:11 NIV)

Just before he was taken up to

heaven, Jesus told the disciples to stay in Jerusalem and wait for the Holy Spirit. They waited together for ten days. Then, with a loud noise like rushing wind,



tongues of fire appeared and rested on each of them. Filled with the Holy Spirit, they suddenly were able to speak in different languages (Acts 2:1-3). God-fearing people from many countries were staying in Jerusalem and, hearing the noise, rushed to see what it was. Though they spoke different languages, each of them heard what the disciples were saying in their own language and were totally amazed. The disciples received the gift of healing and many other gifts as well (Acts 2:5-11).

As Jesus was preparing His disciples for His departure before He was taken back to heaven, He said, "The Advocate, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, will teach you all things and will remind you of everything I have said to you. Peace I leave with you; my peace I give you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled and do not be afraid" (John 14:26-27 NIV).

Simpson speculated that the lack of fear the horses show towards the wild fires is handed down from their ancestors. Jesus, our brother, delivered on a much bigger promise through fire to His disciples. As believers, we too have the Holy Spirit who brings us peace and blesses us with many gifts and talents.

Our heritage comes from the Lord. Throughout His time on earth, He taught the people in many different ways not to worry or be upset but to trust in Him. All who choose to follow Jesus and accept His free gift of the Holy Spirit are united with Him and the Father. When we learn to recognize the still small voice of the Spirit and trust and follow God, we will be safe from the dangerous fires of the world and accomplish the great things God puts in our path.

With the peace and joy of the new life the Spirit gives us, let's seek God's guidance

To My CHHA Family



I am excited for this new chapter in my life. I will no longer have to give up these amazing animals I love.


God bless all of you and know that even when we don't know what is going on, God does. He loves us with a love we cannot fathom.

Roger was a Standardbred trainer and driver based at The Meadows for 25 years. He then worked at Zinchaks and Dach Dime Manufacturing. He was a true outdoorsman, enjoying fishing, hunting, mowing his lawn, gardening, taking walks in nature, and watching deer and birds. He also enjoyed bonfires and spending time with his family.



Kenneth "Butch" James Daniels, 73, of Clayton, DE,

died Feb 20. Butch was an accomplished blacksmith. He spent over 4 decades shoeing harness horses. He was an artist with the hammer and anvil. Skip DeMull, 67, of South Lyon, MI, died March 25. Skip owned, trained, drove and bred

Standardbreds. He had a medical emergency on the track after finishing fourth with BB Fire. He was transported to Cleveland Clinic Hillcrest Hospital where he passed away after undergoing emergency heart surgery. Northfield Park said, "Our thoughts and prayers are with his wife Julie, his family

and friends, and the harness racing community." **Richard R. (Dick) DeSantis**, 88, formerly of Saratoga

Springs, NY, died Dec 24. Dick began a successful decades long career driving and training harness horses when he was 10 years old. He raced throughout the United States and Canada with his main stables at Saratoga Raceway and Vernon Downs. After Dick retired from racing, he continued working as a horse identifier and racing judge at various Midwest harness tracks, including Indiana Downs.

Wayne Wesley Farthing, 81, died April 7. Wayne was a partner in The Broken Brokers Ltd. with his late friend Richard Barchent. Today, The Broken Brokers own more than 20 horses, and several new foals are expected soon. He worked with his parents at Farthing Real Estate & Auctioneers and became president in 1988. He conducted hundreds of livestock, farm, real estate, and personal property auctions throughout his career and was still a licensed real estate broker at the time of his death.

Theodore L. Higgins, 85, died April 23. Theodore was a blacksmith and trained, raced, and bred Standardbreds. He worked as a press set for New England Wooden Ware for 43 years.



Stefan Hultman, 61, died April 12. Stefan was one of the most successful Swedish trainers of this century. His victories include the Prix d'Amérique, Elitloppet and Grand Prix de l'UET. He was named Trainer of the Year in Sweden twice and was inducted into the Hall of Fame in 2017.

Evelyn Johnson, 68, of Ringgold, LA, formerly of Springfield, IL, died Feb 14. Evelyn has been a USTA member since 1985. She attended the Morven Park International Equestrian Center and was a riding and jumping instructor. Evelyn has been a faithful CHHA member for over a decade.



Sebastian Gerard Zachary Triscari, 71, died April 18.

Sebastian was an entrepreneur. He began with a career in television production and later founded Triscari Productions. His company created more than 30,000 commercials. His company hosts the Winbak Farm website and the website for the Standardbred Horse Sale Co. (Harrisburg).



Calvin Edward Wright, 76, died March 18. Calvin was introduced to harness racing at the early age of 14, by his stepfather, Emmor Baily. He enjoyed a 50-year racing career. He went skydiving on the same day as winning his first race, and said racing was the bigger thrill.



Frank Yanoti, 82, died April 24. Frank spent his entire

adult life in and around harness racing at Monticello Raceway. He owned and trained Standardbreds and stabled in the same barn at Monticello since the 1960s. He served on the board of directors of the Monticello Harness Horsemen's Association for nearly 13 years and was a founding member of the association's




Horsemen's Relief Fund and current retirement plan.

Stable Recovery Program

It's no secret that horse racing — Standardbred or Thoroughbred — can be a tough life. The difficulties of the daily grind of horse care - the ups and downs of racing, travel, stable management, the strain on the body, soul and pocketbook can become overwhelming. Relationships stretch to the breaking point. Self-confidence and discipline can corrode. A tough life. People in every area of racing — from owners to grooms, trainers to drivers, breeders to track employees, face countless daily challenges. When it's overwhelming, some turn to alcohol or drugs to ease the pain. That decision can lead to lifelong suffering and dependence.

Racetrack chaplains are called to serve people and families with dependency struggles. Recently, in the Thoroughbred world, a new and *blessed* resource has emerged to offer help and hope. The **Stable Recovery Program** is a cooperative effort supported by major farms and businesses in Lexington Ky, spearheaded by Frank Taylor of Taylor Made Farm, that offers a live-in recovery program for men struggling with drug and alcohol abuse. Recently, I visited the program and was amazed when I sat down with the Christian Counselor, who heads up Stable Recovery, which has had remarkable success giving people a leg up in a new life dealing with addictions. Their secret? The Horses!

For months, participants are immersed in daily farm work and horse care. The program provides basic living needs and teaches them life skills caring for horses on the beautiful Taylor farm complex – from mucking stalls to fence repair and handling the horses themselves, instilling a sense of purpose, hope and self-confidence in a supportive community. Over months, minds and hearts are changed – in no small part because they are invited to come *to know Jesus* and dedicate their lives to Him. Sobriety and restored relationships emerge.

The program was recognized in January 2025 with a special Eclipse Award for their remarkable work. And it's just begun. To learn more, go to: https://stablerecovery.net/
