# Winning the Race By Chaplain Lee Alphen

The thrill! The prestige! Winning a big horse race is a huge adrenaline rush! We know winning begins with a well-conditioned, fast, sound horse. And, that it is critical for the driver to stay focused on the race, pace the horse appropriately and have a winning attitude.

Staying focused means thinking strategically about the race as it is playing out and not calculating gambling winnings while passing the tote board; picturing a huge, sizzling celebration steak; wondering why the track isn't up to par or smirking, thinking the driver beside us doesn't have a clue. Distractions may just put the winner's circle out of sight.



The apostle Paul writes about the race of life. "I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith" (2 Timothy 4:7 NIV). In life we battle the forces of evil: temptation; lust for money, power, sex and other enticements of the world and the devil. However, we must remember that life is a "good fight" thanks to Jesus paying the price for all our sins. If we put our trust in Christ, we are guaranteed the trophy, the righteous crown (2 Timothy 4:8).

At the track our focus is on how to best manage a winning stable. We think about training schedules, feeding programs, shoeing, having the right people in our shedrow and hopefully not too much vet work. Selecting the right drivers for each horse is also a very important consideration.

How much time do we spend thinking about our lives, how we are living and where we are headed besides with our horses.



I fear no evil; for thou art with me; thy rod and thy staff, they comfort me.


Thou preparest a table before me in the presence of my enemies; thou anointest my head with oil, my cup overflows.




**Dennis Owen Dowd**, 77, of Orange, NJ, died Jun 23. Dennis' family has been involved in Thoroughbred horse racing for generations.

**Dr John Gary Gibson**, 93, of Jackson, MI, died Jun 3. John was a harness horse trainer, driver, and veterinarian who focused on treating

and veterinarian who focused on treating racing injuries. He traveled the country training and driving Standardbred horses. His veterinary practice was nationally recognized for his expertise in lameness and leg injuries. In the rough-and-tumble world of harness racing, he stood out for his honesty and kindness: he didn't curse,



George Hensley Jr, 73, of Livonia, MI, died May 27. George owned, trained, drove and bred Standardbreds. He devoted over thirty years to Dunn Rite Land Service. He took great pride in caring for his parents, George and Ann Hensley, during their time of declining health.

Steven Ray Hoskinson, 69, of Heath, OH, died Apr 6. Steve, a Christian who loved the Lord, was involved with harness racing his whole life. He was a trainer and driver and even bred a few. He attended Heath Church of Christ. He was a heavy equipment operator by trade his entire life. Steve and his wife, Leslie, are CHHA members.



Harry Malcolm "Mac" Lilley died Jun 7. In the 1970's Mac developed an interest in harness racing. He purchased his first stallion, ZIP TAR, and began the family farm. Over the next 50 years his farm was home to over 47 stallions. Mac had a passion for growing the breeding industry in Ontario. He also raced his own small stable in Canada and USA.


John Allan Martin, 73, died May 19. John began racing at 14. He owned trained and drove Standardbreds. When most who were blessed to be part of his life reminisce about him, they are sure to remember his love of family, his Indian reservation, harness racing, and his loyalty to the Buffalo Bills, Sabres and Bandits.

**Rick Merryman**, 55, of Freelton, Ontario, died Jun 23. Rick dedicated much of his life to his work as a groom. Among his favorite horses were Blue Buckaroo, Alastor Hanover, and Whosurboy.

Stephen Charles Moore, 73, of Washington CH, OH, died Jun 6. Steve was a lifelong Standardbred trainer and driver. He had worked for a time at Armco Steel and Steelox but had more recently worked as a truck driver for Hogan Trucking.

Jackie "Jack" L. Myers, 86, of Bristol, IN, died Jun 9.

Jack raced a big stable for over 40 years. He raced in his home state as well as Michigan, Ohio, and Illinois. His favorite races took place at the fairgrounds. Professionally, he served as president of Advanced Affiliates, Inc. in Goshen for over 25 years, later stepping into a director role.



William D, Myers, 87, of Goshen, IN, died May 24. William owned and trained harness horses. He was an officer for Dayton and Beavercreek, Ohio police departments. Later he became a Management Consultant for manufacturers for over 25 years. He was a member of Faith United Methodist Church in Goshen.

Freddie Lee Patton, Sr, 84, of Clinton, MS, died Jun 29. Freddie was a long-time horseman from Mississippi who owned, trained and drove Standardbred horses.



**Linda Sorenson**, 70, died Jun 14. Linda worked 50 years in the harness racing industry in several

states, including Michigan, Florida, Kentucky, Alabama, Indiana and New York. Her hard work shone through as she had many successes during racing seasons. She was a huge advocate for Standardbred horses, even finding forever homes as they retired.

Gene Vallandingham, 84, of Sacramento, CA, died Jun

7. Gene was an owner, trainer, driver and breeder of harness horses. Gene and his brother Bill were elected into the California Harness Racing Hall of Fame in 2014. He grew up in the harness racing business in Kentucky before going to Illinois where he won driving titles at Washington Park and Aurora Downs.


