Mud In Your Eye By Chaplain Lee Alphen

At 38, Stanley Dancer became harness racing's first to win over one million dollars in a single season. However, a 1965 article in *Time*, "Harness Racing: Mud in Stanley's Eye," tells us Stanley had never yet won trotting's most prestigious race, the Hambletonian. To make matters worse, his wife's horse, Egyptian Candor, won the race against him that year.

Heavy rains fell the night before the Hambletonian, leaving the racing surface the consistency of soft fudge. Noble Victory, with Stanley aboard, broke stride in two heats, then finished third in the final heat. Stanley said, "He seemed like he was anchored. He just couldn't handle the going."

According to the article, "Unlike flat -racing thoroughbreds, who plant their hoofs, then pick them straight up—and often revel in the softer footing of an off track—trotters slide their hoofs slightly forward each time they take a stride; they tend to slip and get mired in the mud."

Stanley's niece, Linda, and her husband, Bob Condon, participated in a 2021 search and rescue for a quarter horse named Diesel who escaped from his paddock. Armed with prayers from our CHHA prayer partners, Linda and Bob led a two-day search, which included neighbors and a hunter/tracker, several miles into the woods where they found the 1,200-pound horse buried neck-deep in mud.

During the four-hour rescue effort, the horse's owners, firefighters and a veterinarian joined the search. The search party used a winch, shovels, axes and straps to free Diesel. Then they put down a track of rubber mats which provided solid footing and allowed him to exit the forest unharmed.

God answered our prayers. Praise God! Linda said, "It was really a miracle, he (Diesel) had less than an hour to live... only his head was exposed out of that swamp/mud."



City officials took offense at the prophecies of Jeremiah and reported him to King Zedekiah who gave them permission to punish him. The officials dropped Jeremiah down into a mud filled cistern with ropes, forcing him to sink in the mud.

When Ebed-melech the Cushite, a eunuch in the king's house, went and told Zedekiah the officials had treated Jeremiah poorly, Zedekiah sent for him. He listened to Jeremiah's prophecy in private (Jeremiah 38:1-16).

Jeremiah told the king, "This is what the Lord God Almighty, the God of Israel, says: 'If you surrender to the officers of the king of Babylon, your life will be spared and this city will not be burned down; you and your family will live.

But if you will not surrender to the officers of the king of Babylon, this city will be given into the hands of the Babylonians and they will burn it down; you yourself will not escape from them (Jeremiah 38:17-18)"

I've read various suggestions concerning the origins of the term "mud in your eye." We can relate to the idea of the winning horse being congratulated for throwing mud at those behind. In World War I the saying equated to wishing the soldiers, who got very muddy living and fighting in trenches, good luck. Some say farmers referred to the soil as mud and toasted a good harvest with a drink in the taverns. Personally, I'm betting the saying originated when Jesus healed the blind man by smearing mud in his eyes (John 9).

God brings good from all things for those who love Him (Romans 8:28). I am sure Stanley celebrated with his wife when her horse won the big race even though she beat him. Certainly, Linda Condon requesting our prayers helped in the rescue of Diesel, blessing his owners and causing all his rescuers to give thanks to God. Unfortunately, King Zedekiah did not follow the instruction the Lord gave through Jeremiah. He tried to escape through a tunnel and was captured. It did not go well with him. Jeremiah, however, remained with the people of Judah and continued to serve God.

Linda Condon got it right when she turned to God to save Diesel. The prophet Jeremiah was also saved from the mud filled cistern because he trusted God. When we find ourselves in the muck and mire, the best thing we can do is to cry to the Lord for help, trusting in His mercy and goodness. The psalmist had the right approach with Psalm 40. Verses 1-4 are printed below.

Psalm 40:1-4 (NIV)

I waited patiently for the Lord; he inclined to me and heard my cry.

² He drew me up from the desolate pit, out of the miry bog,

and set my feet upon a rock, making my steps secure.

³ He put a new song in my mouth, a song of praise to our God.

Many will see and fear

and put their trust in the Lord.

⁴ Happy are those who make the Lord their trust.



Suzanne F. Christensen, 83, of Monmouth, ME, died Aug 19. Sue loved harness racing and owned a few horses. She worked for the Department of Transportation. At the same time, she worked for Winner's Circle OTB for several years. She also ran money for the tellers in the infield to the money room at the Fryeburg Fair. Her horse, Grandma Finn, was named Horse of the Year.



Lallah Cummings, 80, of Hamburg, NY, died Aug 7. Lallah's husband, John, trained and drove harness horses. Their four sons, John Jr, Tony, Todd and Kevin are all trainers/ drivers as is Todd's son, Kyle. All have been competing at Batavia Downs since the late 1970s.


Lonny L. Hale, 64, died Jul 20. Lonny followed in his father, George's, footsteps training racehorses at Vernon Downs and various harness racetracks in New York where he was leading trainer multiple years. To many he was considered an expert in troubleshooting a racehorse.

David Helstowski, of Hanover, PA, died Jul 26. Dave worked at Hanover Shoe Farms for over two decades and became a familiar face in the industry—whether leading yearlings in Hanover's sale videos or in the Harrisburg sales ring throughout the 1980s and '90s. From 1993 to 1999, he managed Hanover's New Jersey stallion farm. In the 2000s, he went on to serve as breeding manager at Fashion Farms.











Mique Ann Malibashka, 76, of Cream Ridge, NJ, died Aug 16. Mique and her late husband, Thomas, established Camelot Farm in 1979. They worked together at White Birch Farm where Tom trained horses and Mique ran the lunch truck. Mique was a CHHA member.



Richard L. "Ricky" Murphy, 65, of Dover, DE, died Aug 22. Ricky worked with horses all of his life. Ricky owned, trained, and drove race horses. He was indeed gifted, oftentimes taking on the "outlaws," the unruly horses that no one else would take. He often turned those horses into winners. Many fellow horsemen would characterize Ricky as a great horseman with great hands and a great driver. Ricky worked for and trained for numerous stables over the years and worked for the Sean Bier Stable at the time of his passing. If you could not find Ricky tending to the horses, you could always find him tinkering in his barn or playing around on a tractor or skid loader.

Joseph G. Muscara, 74, of Huntingdon Valley, PA, died Jul 16. Joe worked for many years alongside his father

building homes, developing the Jacksonville Road Industrial Park, and later found immense success in harness racing and horse breeding. Joe was a man of broad interests. A multi-instrumentalist, he played the piano, guitar, cello, and drums, and dabbled in songwriting in later years. He and his wife, Johanna, enjoyed sailing the Chesapeake Bay.



Michael Paradise, 83, died Aug 10. "Mike was an

ambassador for the sport who served for several years as president of the Illinois Harness Horsemen's Association (IHHA)" said Marty Engel. He had a passion for harness racing, and he was a promoter who helped grow the sport through the years on cable TV, as a PR man, and a newspaper handicapper.


